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

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


Fig. 1. Centrepiece—Tatting with Coronation Cord. See Doilies to Match on page 14, and Directions on page 10 $\,$

PRISCILLA TATTING BOOK No. 2 Explanation of Stitches

DOUBLE STITCH (d s). Two half stitches made with the shuttle, forming one stitch. RING (r). The required number of double stitches made with the

forming one slutch. RING (r). The required number of double stitches made with the shutle thread only, and drawn up into a ring. CHAIN (ch). A scallop or cord made with the ball thread, on the shutle thread, not drawn up into a ring. PICOT (p). A loop left between stitches; (l p) a long picot; (sm p) a very small picot. SLIP STITCH (sl st). Thread passed under the work to the next point.


JOSEPHINE KNOT. A ring formed of single stitches, like the first half of a d s; it may be of four to twelve stitches.

JOIN. A loop drawn through a picot, shuttle passed through it, and thread drawn tightly. Or with the ball thread; or threads tied around. CONTINUOUS THREAD. Thread unbroken between shuttle and ball. REVERSE. Turn the work, and continue as before, but in an op-

REFERSE. Turn the work, and continue to below, and the position,
THE TERM, 3 ps 2 d s between, of any number, means, as many d s before and after as between.
SETS OF STITCHES (sts). 4.4, or other numbers; are single stitches of the stated number, like the first half of a d s; then the same number of single stitches, like the last half of a d s; this is one set of stitches.

Directions

Modern Tatting .- The new or Modern Tatting differs in general style and appearance from that with which we are all familiar. The chief charm of the old tatting lay in its fineness, and in the feathery daintiness lent by the use of many picots; that of the new lies rather in its conventionality of design, its dura-




bility and its closeness of texture, which render it useful for many purposes for which the old was

unfit. New materials, stitches, terms, and directions are used in the Modern Tatting.

In stitches, besides those described on page 3, are several new variations of old stitches. As double rings; shell picot, a very loose Josephine knot of five stitches, made with only the shuttle thread, generally at the joining of a chain to the row before, but may be on other parts of the chain. Slip stitch, may be done neatly at the back of the work, with a fine crochet-hook, carrying the thread back of stitches or through them; by running through chains; by sewing, or in various other ways to suit the situation.

In the directions for Tatted Cords, page 28, will be found several new cords which may be used in numerous ways to furnish pleasing variety and new figures in tatting.

A worker who well merits the title of Lady Superior in the art of Tatting, has given the follow-



ing valuable hints, which will add greatly to the perfection of the work, if carried out.

-as much as possible. "Slip stitch from one row to another when convenient.

"When using continuous thread, a second ball for refilling the shuttle will avoid cutting the ball thread. "After tying the ends it will often make the work

neater to sew them with very fine thread.

"If the edge of the work seems too full it will press out flat and look much better than if it must be stretched.

"With a large piece of work it is well to press occasionally while making, and all work should be thoroughly pressed when finished.

"To press, place the work right side down, on flannel, pull well into shape with the fingers; with a wet cloth over the work, then a dry cloth, press with quite a hot iron, remove first cloth after a little, continue pressing until work is thoroughly dry."

The old saying about "tricks in all trades," applies in one sense to tatting. There are so many new ways, makeshifts, and ingenious devices, for gaining dexterity, perfection, and beauty of design. One worker rarely uses the ring, instead laps and joins the chain into a ring. Another rarely uses the chain, but says: "Whenever possible I leave a thread and crochet over it. The result is about the same."




FIG. 4. INSERTION. SEE PAGE 4

We hear much of "the new way of tatting," which many have long known as the only way. It is, passing the shuttle between the first and second fingers of the left hand, instead of around the whole hand, and is much more rapid. Full illustrated directions for it are given in Priscilla Tatting Book No. 1; price 25 cents.

Materials .-- Where the words "crochet cotton" are used in the text of this book, the cotton referred , to is the hard-twisted cotton known by such names as Cordonnet, Cordonnet Special, Cordichet, Kord-net, etc., which can be purchased wherever needlework supplies are sold.

The numbers of crochet cotton generally used are, for very small edgings, Nos. 70 to 100; other edgings, Nos. 50 and 60, also for other fine work; from Nos. 3 to 30 for towels, and very coarse work.

Cover Design .- Directions for the pattern on the cover of this book will be found on page 48.




FIG 5. EDGING. SEE PAGE 4

Figure 2. Edging. — Begin with the leaflets at left of a daisy. R 9 d s, p, 5 d s, p, 14 d s. R 14 d s, p, 5 d s, p, 9 d s. Ch 16 d s, turn. DAISY. *Ring 1*—10 d s, join 1st p of 1st r, 4 d s, p, 4 d s, p, 10 d s. *Ring 2*—10 d s, join last r, 8 d s, p, 10 d s. Join all rings. Repeat ring 2, twice; r I, twice; then r 2, omitting the last p, turn. Ch 15, join upper leaflet; ch 10 d s, p, 11 d s, turn. Repeat first leaflet, join 1st p to 6th r of the daisy. Repeat r and ch 16 d s. Join 1st r of daisy to first leaflet, and 5th r of first daisy.

Figure 3. Beading. — But one thread is used. R 3 ds, 3 p 3 d s between, turn, leave a short thread: r 7 p 3 d s between (bet), turn, leave same length of thread; r 3 p 3 d s bet, join first p to last p of the small ring, turn; r 7 p 3 d s bet, join first three p to the last three of the large r.

Figure 4. Insertion. — Ring 4 d s, 7 p 3 d s between (bet), 4 d s; ch 7 d s; repeat r on the other side; ch 7 d s; reverse, r 4 d s, join 4th p of the first r, 6 p 3 d s bet, 4 d s. Repeat on alternate sides.




FIG. 6. EDGING. SEE PAGE 4

Figure 5. — Make a r of 7 d s, p, 7 d s; ch encircling it, 5 d s, p, 5 d s, p. 9 d s, p, 9 d s, p, 5 d s, p, 5 d s; join base of ring; ch 5 d s, 3 p, 3 d s between (bet), 5 d s; r 5 d s, join 1st p of ch, 2 d s, p, 5 d s; ch 5 d s, 3 p 3 d s bet, 5 d s.

Figure 6. — Make a large r with 4 d s, p, 4 d s, 3 p I d s between (bet), 4 d s, p, 4 d s, p, 9 d s, p, 9 d s, close. Ch 6 d s, p, 3 d s, p, 3 d s, p, 3 d s, join p bet the two 9 d s. R 3 d s, join last p, 4 d s, p, 4 d s, p, 3 d s. Ch 3 d s, join last p of r, 3 d s, p, 3 d s, p, 6 d s, join p at top of large r, ch 3 d s. Repeat as in cut.

Figure 7. — Make all of the picots small. Begin with the 4-ringed figure. R 4 d s, p, 4 d s, turn, ch 4 d s, 3 p 2 d s between, 4 d s; r 4 d s, join p of first r, 4 d s. Repeat ch and r twice, join rings in p of the first r, making a scallop of 4 r and 3 ch. Repeat r opposite the last. Repeat ch and r twice, join rings in p of first r, making a scallop with 3 r and 2 ch, ch 5 d s; r 3 d s, join mid-p of 4-ringed figure, 4 d s, p, 4 d s, p, 3 d s; ch 5 d s. Repeat the 3-ringed figure, join 1st p to the other 3-ringed figure. Repeat from beginning.

Figure 8.—Large r 5 d s, p, 5 d s, 3 p I d s between (bet), 5 d s, p, 5 d s, p, 9 d s, p, 9 d s. Ch 6 d s, p, 3 d s, p, 3 d s, p, 3 d s. Trefoil, 3 d s, join last p of ch, 3 d s, 2 p 3 d s bet, 3 d s. Centre r, 3 d s, join last p, 4 d s, 3 p I d s bet, 4 d s, p, 3 d s. Repeat first r and join. Ch 3 d s, join last p of r. 3 d s, p, 3 d s, p, 6 d s, join p at top of r. Ch 2 d s; r 3 d s, p, 3 d s, 3 p I d s bet, 3 d s, ch 2 d s.

Figure 9. Insertion. — R 5 d s, 3 p 5 d s between, 5 d s; ch 6 d s, p, 6 d s, repeat the r, join 1st ring; ch 8 d s, p, 8 d s. Repeat rings and chains, joining as in the cut.

Figure 10.—Repeat the large r and ch of Fig. 6. R 3 d s, join p of ch, 3 d s, 6 p I d s between (bet),




FIG. 7. EDGING. SEE PAGE 4

7 d s, join ring; r 7 d s, join last p, 5 p I d s between, 3 d s, p, 3 d s, join r; ch 3 d s, join last p, 3 d s, p, 3 d s, p, 6 d s, join p in top of large r; ch 2 d s; r 6 d s, p, 6 d s; ch 2 d s.

Figure 11. Insertion. — This is made with two shuttles. First shuttle, ch I d s, p, * 5 d s, p, 5 d s; second shuttle, r 5 d s, p, 5 d s, p, 2 d s, p, 2 d s, p, 5 d s, p, 5 d s; first shuttle, ch 5 d s, p, 5 d s, join to first p made; second shuttle, 7 d s; first shuttle, r 5 d s, p, 5 d s, p, 2 d s, p, 5 d s; second shuttle, ch 7 d s. Repeat from *, joining together the rings of the three rows.

Figure 12. Insertion. — Ch 7 d s, p, 7 d s, r 3 p 3 d s between (bet), ch 7 d s, p, 7 d s, r 9 p, 3 d s bet. Repeat. For use as insertion, make a second row of edging and join the picot to the first row.

Figure 13. Trimming. — Make clover leaf (c l), 4 d s, p, 3 d s, p, 2 d s, p, 2 d s, p, 3 d s, p, 4 d s, make 3 r joined at 1st p; ch 6 d s, p, 6 d s, small r 3 d s, p, 2 d s, p, 2 d s, p, 3 d s; ch, 6 d s, p, 6 d s; c l joining mid-p of first r to mid-p of last r of the c l before. Repeat from beginning until there

are seven c l and six small r; repeat ch r ch, twice; then c l, joining mid-p of first r to last of the small r; mid-p of 2d r to side p of first small r, and mid-p of 3d r join to mid-p of first c l. Ch, small r ch and a c l of which join mid-p of first r to the joining of the two former c l. Repeat until 5 c l form a half circle, then reverse the c l, joining the first to the last one of the circle before. Repeat.

Figure 14. Trimming for Hat-band. — Use No. 40 crochet cotton, white or écru. Make a ch, 5 p 2 d s between (bet), 12 d s; r, 2 d s, 7 p 2 d s bet, 5 d s; leave a short thread; r 5 d s, join last p, 4 p 2 d s bet, 5 d s; r 5 d s, join, 6 p 2 d s bet, 5 d s; repeat 2d r, then 1st r. Ch 12 d s, join, 6 p, 2 d s bet, 9 d s; r 4 d s, join 3d p of last r, 4 d s, p, 4 d s; r 4 d s, join, 3 p 2 d s bet, 4 d s; r 4 d s, join, 4 d s, p, 4 d s; ch 9 d s, join. Make another row and join as in the cut.




FIG. 9. INSERTION. SEE PAGE 4

Figure 15. Trimming for Hat-rim. — Use Crochet cotton No. 40, white or écru. Make a r 4 d s, 6 p 2 d s between (bet), 4 d s; ch 4 d s, 11 p, 4 d s; turn, r, 9 p 2 d s bet; ch 2 d s, 4 p, join 2d p of first r, 6 p 2 d s bet; d d s; r, 3 p, 3 d s bet; r, 3 d s, join last r, 3 d s, join 1st p of large centre r, 3 d s, p, 3 d s; repeat r, completing a trefoil; ch, 2 d s, 11 p 2 d s bet, 4 d s. Repeat trefoils, joining the one before, and every other p of the central r. Make 5 chains around the trefoils. Join the next outer ch to the 1st p of the first ch, the large outer r to an inner ch, and the figures, by 3d p of adjoining chains.

Figure 16. Trimming. — Make a ch of 6 d s, 2 p 3 d s between (bet), 8 d s, p, 6 d s; r, 12 d s, join end of the ch, 8 d s, p, 3 d s; r 3 d s, join last p, 8 d s, p, 8 d s, p, 4 d s; ch 9 d s; r 4 d s, join last p, 8 d s, p, 12 d s; very close to last, r, 12 d s, p, 8 d s, p, 4 d s; ch 9 d s; r 4 d s, join last p, 8 d s, p, 8 d s, p, 3 d s; r 3 d s, join last p, 8 d s, p, 8 d s, p, 3 d s; r 3 d s, join last p, 8 d s, p, 8 d s, p, 8 d s, 2 p 3 d s bet, 6 d s, join p of last r. Repeat. Make a second row and join to the first, as in the cut.

Figure 17. Insertion. - This is made with two




FIG. 10. EDGING. SEE PAGE 4

shuttles and two spools. Make a clover leaf (c 1); first r 8 d s, p, 6 d s, p, 8 d s, p, 6 d s; second r 6 d s, join last p, 8 d s, p, 8 d s, p, 6 d s; third r 6 d s, join, 8 d s, p, 6 d s, p, 8 d s. Join the second thread to the 2d p of the 1st r; ch 8 d s, p, 12 d s, p. 6 d s, join mid-p of 2d r; ch 6 d s, p, 12 d s, p, 8 d s, join mid-p of 3d r, ch 6 d s; repeat c l, then with the first shuttle, repeat ch around c l, and a c l.

Figure 18. Silk Dress Trimming. — This can be made with crochet or purse silk. Begin with small r and ch between (bet) the large figures. R 3 p 3 d s bet; ch 9 d s, p, 9 d s; r 10 d s, 6 p 2 d s bet, 10 d s; ch, 5 p 2 d s bet, join 1st p in large r; * ch 6 d s; r 3 p 3 d s bet; ch 6 d s; join 2d p in large r; * repeat from * to * four times, joining rings together; ch 5 p 4 d s bet, join base of large r. Repeat ch and small r. If these figures are joined to the small r bet, the trimming will be firmer, and still more so if the adjoining rings at points of the figures are joined. Ufper row—R 3 p 3 d s bet; ch 9 d s, join ch of first row at p after the small r, 9 d s; clover leaf of rings 3 p 5 d s bet, joined by first p; repeat ch, joining next p of first row.

Figure 19. Opera Bag. *Materials.* — Ecru crochet cotton No. 5, coronation cord (see Fig. 19½), one yard of ribbon, six in. wide, and 1½ yds. of fancy braid.

Join the thread to the cord; ch 3 d s, p, 3 d s; join cord, ch 3 d s, p, 3 d s; r 7 p 3 d s between (bet).




FIG. 12. INSERTION. SEE PAGE 4

Repeat rings and chains, joining the cord until there are eight of each. Join last ch to 2d p of last r; ch 3 d s, p, 3 d s, join cord, 3 d s, p, 3 d s, sm p. Repeat ch then r, joining 2d p to the sm p of ch, and 4th p to mid-p of last r. Continue up, as on the first side, joining rings by mid-ps. Second row— Chains and rings as first row, but reversed. After the r at turn of the end, ch 3 d s; r 5 p, 3 d s bet, join mid-p to corner next the nearest r of the first row, ch 3 d s. Repeat r, two ch, 2 r, short ch of 3 d s; r joined; short ch, then repeat rings and chains to the top. Third row—Turn ch back, join 2d p of last r, ch of 5 p, join same r, 6th p, bar of

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3 d s, join 2d p of next r; repeat until the corner, then add four r of 3 p, with bars of 3 d s on each side, to fill spaces at the bottom; and continue up the side. Fourth row—Is of chains of 8 p and bars of 3 d s only. TATTED COLLS FOR CORNERS.—With continuous thread; hold doubled end of thread in left thumb and finger, ch 4 d s, p, draw shuttle thread very close; continue with a p at every 3d d s. Draw close to form coil as made, and make 50 p. Sew on the wrong side. Crocheted balls are fastened by cords under the coils. BALLS.—Ch 4, join. In the ring make 10 double crochet (d), next row, 2 d in each d, making 20 d, 3 rows plain, then d in every other d, making 10 d. Stuff with cotton and close by making d in every other d. Crochet a ch cord of the length required.

To MAKE BAG.—Cut from linen canvas two pieces to fit tatting section one-half inch smaller, except at top. Cover these pieces with silk, turn edge of silk over canvas, and baste in place. Turn down two inches at each end of ribbon for heading. Gather remaining length on both edges. Sew gathered edges around sides and bottom of silk-covered sections. Blindstitch tatting section to silk-covered centres, letting last row tatting scallop overlap gathers in ribbon.

To LINE BAG.—Lay bag flat. Cut two pieces silk, size and shape of bag without the heading, seam to-




FIG. 13. TRIMMING. SEE PAGE 4

gether, tack inside bag, gather both ribbon and lining where they meet at top of bag. Let braid run across top of tatting section for finish, fastening ends under coils, as also the handles.

Figures 20-21. Yoke.—Use one ball of No. 80 crochet cotton and two shuttles. Tie shuttle threads together, using one thread as from a ball, ch 9 d s, p, 9 d s, p, until the ch is a little longer than the width of the yoke. Turn, with second shuttle make ring 3 d s, called a shell picot (s p), ch 4 d s, s p, 4 d s, join to last p of foundation ch; continue with 4 d s, s p, 4 d s, s p, 4 d s, join to next p of foundation ch. Continue the length of foundation ch. After joining to the end of ch, turn work *around*, not over, and continue as before, noticing that at the edges after work is turned a ch with 3 sp is made. Join the ch of the rows through the loop of former row as in crocheting (see detail, Fig. 21).

Figure 22. Wild Rose Spray of Black Crochet Silk.—The stems and parts of roses and buds are made in the tatted cord effect, in sets of stitches (see explanation, page 3).

Rose.—With continuous thread. Leave a p at beginning, work $I_3 p 2 d s$ between (bet); form r by joining p left at beginning. Work six small petals around this r, of 6 sets, 4-4 sts each; join each

second p around ring. Second row of petals; 5 d s, 12 small p, 3 d s bet, 5 d s, join each of the remaining ps on r. Work sets of 4-4 sts for stem to required length. To avoid ends make the stem first with continuous thread, and work on the rose after stem is made. Sew ends under the rose.

Rose-Bud. - Begin buds without ends and at centre of point of bud. Leaving p at beginning, work 7 sets 4-4 sts with a p at beginning and centre of each set. Centre of bud; leaving a p; 27 d s, join p at beginning of bud; p 27 d s, join p. Work 12 sets 4-4 sts, join p left in last row at point of bud, work cluster of 5 long ps, I d s between, join at same p. Work 12 sets 4-4 sts, join at beginning of this row. Work 15 d s, form small loop at base of bud, by joining again in same place. Cross small loop and proceed with stem by sets of 4-4 sts. This makes the largest bud. Smaller ones are made with 6 sets 4-4 sts in centre, omitting the picots and working enough d s in first row, and sets of sts in second row, to make the shape desired, leave but 3 long p at end, shape the bud with fingers as made. Make stem of buds and roses from 2 to 4 inches in length.

LEAVES are begun at centre point of leaf, and made the same as buds, except having but one row around centre stem, and are wholly of sets of stitches and graduated in size to suit. Cut the silk after each leaf. Wind a little silk on shuttle, work leaf and 2 sets 4-4 sts after leaf. Cut threads, leaving about 2 inches; wind again for next leaf. Repeat twice; then make 6 sets sts for stem. Join a leaf to stem of this one at point of working; work 2 sets over the threads of the added leaf. Add the other leaf to opposite side of stem, and work over those ends in same manner. After a few sets of stitches the loose ends may be cut close to stem, this makes a cluster of leaves.




Fig. 15. Trimming for Hat-Rim. See Fig. 14, and page 5

The ends of the upper part are all brought together and sewed firmly, then fastened under rose at centre of spray. The rest sewed at the bottom, then wound smoothly with the silk.




FIG. 16. TRIMMING. SEE PAGE 5

Figure 23. Trimming of Metal Thread.-The metal thread is used from the ball, and hides the shuttle thread of crochet cotton. Commence in centre of a figure. Ch p, 3 d s, 8 p 2 d s between (bet); curl in a r, with crochet-hook draw the metal thread back of the shuttle thread, through the 1st p, join, and draw closely. Ch I d s, 3 p 2 d s bet, I d s, join a p of r. Repeat around. At the end of the second row around the centre r, and opposite to its beginning, make a r for the lower end, of 4 d s, 5 p 3 d s bet, 4 d s, join. Continue, as before, to the opposite side of coil; repeat r. Continue around, join next figure to the right, by 2 p. Join the p before lower r; ch 3 p, 3 d s bet, join 2d p of r; ch 5 p, 3 d s bet, join 4th p of r; ch 3 p, 3 d s bet, join p after r. Continue; around the upper r repeat the 3 ch, and close at right side of the r. The end figures have added rings in centre of side chains, of 6 p each. The last row is around all of the figures. Wind cotton on the shuttle enough to finish this row without joining. (Though a join can be made very neatly by sewing and wrapping the thread around.) Joining left of upper chains, 1st p; ch 3 p, 3 d s between, join same ch, next p; ch 2 d s, p, 2 d s, join next p; 2 d s, p, 2 d s, join next p; ch 3 d s, p, 3 d s, skip one p, join; ch 3 d s, p, 3 d s, join next p but one; 2 d s, p, 2 d s, join next p, and repeat twice; ch 7 d s, join together the 2d p from joining, and corresponding p of next figure, 7 d s. Repeat around the figures.

Figure 24. Daisy Spray.—Use crochet silk. The daisies are made separately. With continuous thread, cli a short stem, of a p and ten or twelve sets of 4-4 sts. Ch 16 d s, 3 long p 2 d s between (bet), 16 d s. Form into a loop, crossing at its beginning, shuttle thread over, ball thread under the ch, work 2 d s, draw shuttle thread very tight and thus form the first petal. Make seven petals very close together,




FIG. 17. INSERTION. SEE PAGE 5

join in a ring with first petal, and sew neatly to the stem, and a jet nailhead in the centre of each daisy. *Stem and leaves*—Ch 12 sets of 5-5 sts, p, 5 sets of 4-4 sts, reverse, 2 d s, 13 p 2 d s bet, draw tightly, join p, and form a leaf. Join a daisy by the p left on the stem. Make a set of 4-4 sts, then carry shuttle thread around the daisy to hold it firmly. Join daisies and leaves on opposite sides of the stem. Make the length of stem desired, of 5-5 sts, then another leaf and daisy. Leaving the p in the centre of a set of sts will bring it on the opposite side. Finish the spray with a daisy at the end of the stem, to give it a graceful finish.

Figure 25-32. Collar; Tatting Appliqué on Net.— Cut paper pattern, and baste net on it smoothly.

LATTICE WORK AROUND NECK. (See Fig. 30.)—Use No. 40 crochet cotton. With continuous thread, make p, 3 d s, 7 p 2 d s between (bet), 2 d s. Form small loop by crossing ch I d s, from beginning. Work 6 sets of 5-5 sts; ch 2 d s, Io p I d s bet, 2 d s. Form small loop by crossing beginning of

ch. Work 4 sets of 5-5 sts, cross ch of 5-5 sts first made, 2 sets from first loop. Work 2 sets 5-5 sts, make second loop on same side as first loop of 4 d s, 13 p 2 d s bet, 3 d s. Form large loop by crossing ch at beginning as before. Again 6 sets of 5-5 sts, loop of 2 d s, 10 p 1 d s bet, 2 d s. Form small loop as before. Work 2 sets 5-5 sts, join to first ch of 5-5 sts, 2 sets from first small loop of 10 p. Draw the ball thread under the ch, join with shuttle thread closely so that the ball thread is double around the ch, and shuttle thread straight through the joining; as always the shuttle thread above, ball thread under the work. Draw the ball thread through to the shuttle thread, work 2 sets of 5-5 sts, draw ball thread back which brings the two threads on opposite sides of work, as before. Cross the last long ch of 5-5 sts, work 2 sets 5-5 sts, which completes the pattern to a small loop on the side on which small and large loops alternate. Work lattice-work to reach around the neck. Baste this on, with the small loops even with the net. Work scallops around the outer edge of lattice-work, of 15 p 2 d s bet, join the small loops.

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
Fig. 19. Bag with Coronation Cord and Ribbon. See Detail Fig. 191/2, and page 5

FRONT POINTS OF COLLAR.—Make 4 loops and 4 chains, then a clover leaf with one set of 4-4 sts between rings. Baste the edging around the collar very evenly, and sew to the net before making the last two rows.

First Outer Row—Is all around the collar. At the neck only, of 4 sets 4-4 sts, join 3d p of r, and the net too; between rings, I d s, p, I d s; join 3d p of next r and the net. Continue around the collar with 5 sets of 4-4 sts, and between rings, I set of 3-3 sts, p in centre.

Second Outer Row—This last row omit around the neck. Join p bet scallops, make 2 sets 4-4 sts, 6 ps 2 d s bet, 2 sets 4-4 sts; join p between scallops.

APPLIQUÉ OF MOTIFS AND COILS.—Place a large butterfly, a pair of ferns, and three coils, on the back; a small butterfly, smaller ferns, and three coils on each shoulder; and a flower motif with cluster of three coils, on each front. *Coils*. (See Fig. 85.)—Work



plain d s for three rows, the last with a p after each 2d d s. Make seven coils with three rows of d s, and eight with two rows. Sew rows together as made.

SMALL BUTTERFLY. (See Fig. 31.) —Use cotton No. 40. Body—Make p, and eight sets of 4-4 sts with short ps at centre and longer ps between sets, then two sets with only the short ps, turn, repeat, joining to the long ps. At top join 1st p, then make 14 d s for loop of head, join. First Side Loop—Join 3d p from top, Make 19 sets of 5-5 sts with ps between sets, join end of large loop. Second Side Loop—Join lower side of first side loop—see Fig. 25; make 17 sets of 5-5 sts with ps, join

at same point as last. This forms the larger part of the wing on one side. The smaller wing-Has thirteen sets of 5-5 sts, form in a loop. join at same point. This completes one side; repeat. join the sides together at centre, sew the ends closely between the wings, to be covered by the body. With No. 50 cotton,




Fig. 21. Detail of Yoke, Fig. 20

make small scallops all around the wings, 2 d s, 4 p 2 d s bet, 2 d s; join at each second p on edge of wings.

LARGE BUTTERFLY.-Make in the same way. In the large loop thirty sets 5-5 sts; first side loop

twelve sets; second side loop ten sets; lower part of wing twenty sets. Body eleven sets of 4-4 sts with ps as in Fig. 31. Antennae—Make p, then about an inch of d s, draw very close to make a firm curve, pass through head loop, and sew under body, and the body sew between the wings.

FERN LEAVES.—Use No. 50 cotton. Begin at small end of fern; small p, 3 d s, reverse, 3 p 2 d s bet, form a leaf drawing thread closely, join p. Reversing 3 d s forms the curve toward the sts of the reversed leaf. Work I set 2-2

sts for stem, reverse; 4 p 2 d s bet; form second leaf on opposite side of stem by joining shuttle thread to p at beginning of ch. I set 2-2 sts p, repeat last leaf, but after reversing, join 2d p of first leaf, the joining counting as a p. This is the second leaf on the first side of stem, join p at beginning, make stem, and continue. Increase the number of d s by I before reversing, and ps by I after reversing, but each pair of leaves has the same number of sts. On one side each leaf is joined to the one before on the same side to form the curve. After the third set of leaves increase the

Repeat for the other leaf cluster, a little larger, 12 p on leaves, 21 p on loop.




FIG. 24. DAISY SPRAY OF BLACK SILK. SEE PAGE 7 9

Leave a little thread between this r and next r. R 4 d s, p, 3 d s, 5 p I d s bet, 3 d s, p, 4 d s, close, lock-stitch, join at Ist p of the first ring; repeat first ring.

Leave ¼-inch thread and make r on opposite side from last r made, of 5 d s, join first p, first r of clover leaf, 4 d s, 3 p I d s bet, 4 d s, p, 5 d s, close; leaving ¼-inch thread, repeat on the other Figure 29. Jabot with Battenberg Rings.— Two large Battenberg rings, 2 medium sized and 1 small ring are needed for this jabot, aside from the cotton.

Around one of the medium-sized rings make 10 rings and chains alternating. The ring is of 3 d s, 3 p 3 d s between (bet), 3 d s, and joined to centre by middle p. Chain of 4 d s, 5 ps 4 d s bet, 4 d s. Fasten 2 ch to the second Battenberg ring by middle picots. Fasten the small ring above the last with needle and thread. Around the wheel and 2 rs are rs and chs as in wheel, but ch of 3 ps. Join 6 r to small Battenberg r, 2 each side of the large r and 14 to the wheel.



side, and join. Continue from one side to other until there are five pairs of r besides the clover leaf, each a little smaller than the preceding pair, as the petals grow narrower toward base; fasten in position in wired outer edge with pins, then sew by picots to under side of wire with fine thread. Spread the wire loops so that the inside work will fit tight, that the fagoting between r may be effective.

For centre make large r of 10 p separated by 2 d s, close, surround by small scallops of two threads, 3 d s, 5 p 2 d s bet and $3 \cdot d$ s.

The stamens can be bought. Pass stems of stamens through centre of r last made, arrange petals around centre, wind closely to cover all wire, bend petals to suit taste. For the upper part sew the 2 largest rs together. To each of them attach 3 clover-leaves, each r of 5 d s, 5 p 3 d s between, 5 d s. Join to ring by first and last picots of first and third rings.

For the crocheted ornament, ch 4 and join. In the ring make 10 doubles (d), then 2 d in each of the 10 d. Make 5 plain rounds, then d in every other d, making 10 d. Stuff with cotton and close by making d in every other d. Fasten two ornaments in the centre and run a knot of black velvet ribbon through the two large rs.

Figure 1, Page 2. Centrepiece. Materials.— Five balls No. 20 crochet cotton, and a bolt of coronation cord (see page 14, Fig. 32¹/₂). Diameter, 22 inches. Form a r of 10 threads $1\frac{1}{6}$ -in. in diameter inside, fill it closely with treble crochet, with a second row of double crochet, taking up every st.

1st row—Join centre r, ch 3 d s, 3 p 3 d s between (bet), 3 d s, join 3d st of r, continue around making 16 scallops.

2d row-Join middle (mid) p of ch, ch 3 d s,

3 p 3 d s bet, 3 d s, join mid-p of next ch, repeat.

3d row—Repeat last row with chains 3 d s, 3 p 4 d s bet, 3 d s. 4th row—Th e same with chains 4 d s, 3 p 4 d s bet, 4 d s.

5th row-With chains, 5 d s, 3 p 4 d s bet, 5 d s. 6th row - Join thread and cord to centre p of a scallop, ch 3 d s, 3 p 4 d s bet, 3 d s, make a loop of two sections of cord and join to it, repeat ch, join with next section of cord to mid-p of a scallop, repeat.

7th row -0 f sixteen coils of tatting. Wind a yard or two of thread on the shuttle, hold the doubled end firmly, and ch 55 p 3 d s bet. Draw the thread close enough to form a coil as it is made. At 33d p, join the centre p of ch in last row at the left of a loop of cord; at 36th p join centre p of next ch, at 40th p join the next loop of cord, after 55th p, 3 d ·s and join next cord loop, close and sew in place.

Carry thread to next p of scallop, leave 1/8-inch thread; small r 4 d s, join 1st p of r, 4 d s; leave 1/8-inch thread; large r 3 d s, p, 3 d s join 1st p of next scallop, 5 p 3 d s bet. Alternate small and large rs, making seven of each, join large rs together, and the last one to a scallop of the last row.

14th row—Join mid-p of first large r of the halfwheel, ch 3 ps 4 d s bet, join centre p of next large r, continue




FIG. 28. FLOWER FOR HAIR. SEE PAGE 9




FIG. 29. JABOT. SEE PAGE IO




FIG. 30. LATTICE WORK FOR COLLAR, FIG. 25

Square in the central motif (see Fig. 39)—R 3 d s, 3 p 2 d s between (bet), 3 d s; ch 5 d s, p, 3 d s; turn, r 5 d s, join last p of r, 5 d s; ch 3 d s, p, 3 d s, p, 3 d s; r 5 d s, join mid-p Ist r, 5 d s; ch 3 d s, p, 5 d s, join last p of Ist r; ch 5 d s, p, 5 d s, join base of Ist r; ch 5 d s, p, 5 d s, join p in Ist ch; ch 3 p 2 d s bet, join p of next ch; ch 5

p 2 d s bet, join next p, same ch; ch 3 p 2 d s bet, join next p; ch 5 d s, p, 5 d s, join bet next 2 chs. Leave $\frac{1}{6}$ th of an inch of thread, and repeat from the beginning 3 times.

BORDER AROUND THE SQUARE. — Begin at the outer end. * R, 2 p 7 d s bet; repeat the r and draw closely; ch 2 p 7 d s bet, join 2d p of 2d r; repeat ch; repeat r, join 1st p to the joining of ch and the last r; repeat r closely, join opposite r; repeat ch; repeat r, join with 1st p, the last r; repeat r closely; turn, repeat ch in the opposite direction from the last, join 2d p to mid-p of scallop at right of a corner of the square, and join at end of the ch the 2d p of last r, leaving its 1st r free inside of the ch; repeat ch, join 1st p to 2d p of corner scallop of the square; repeat r, join 2d p to joining of ch and last r; repeat r closely; turn and repeat ch in opposite direction from the last, join 1st p to opposite ch; * repeat r, join 1st p to last r. Beginning with this last r (which repeats the first) repeat from * 7 times, join square and form a circle around it, close.

EDGING AROUND CENTRE MEDALLION.—Join upper p at right side of a point; ch 3 p 3 d s bet; r 3 p 4 d s bet; repeat ch; ring; then 3 ch crossing the top of next point; repeat around.

SMALL MEDALLION (see Fig. 40),—The two medallions finish the ends of the insertion. Centre r, 8 p 2 d s bet; ch 3 d s, join p of ring, make a very small p; repeat around, close. * R, 3 d s, join p of centre r, 3 d s; turn, r, 5 d s, p, 5 d s; turn, ch 7 d s, p, 7 d s; r 5 d s, join p of last r 5 d s; ch 7 d s, p, 7 d s, join between the first two r; ch 3 d s; repeat small r joining centre r; turn, ch 7 d s, p, 7 d s; r 3 d s, p, 3 d s, join p of first ch; 3 d s, ch 7 d s, join p of last ch, 7 d s, r 3 p 3 d s bet; ch 7 d s, join p of last ch, 7 d s. * Repeat between stars three times. *Row around medallion* of chs 3 p 3 d s bet, joining ps of rs, mid-ps of chs, and top of the pair of r.

In this piece of work, but especially in the small medallion, it is very important that chs and rs should be turned in the right direction in making.

WIDE BORDER. — Make a square motif like the centre of the large medallion; below it a three-quarter square, joined to it, in making, by the ps. *The oval*




FIG. 32. MOTIF IN COLLAR, FIG. 25

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motif next; centre r 10 p 2 d s bet. R 3 d s, p, 8 d s, p, 8 d s, p, 8 d s, p, 3 d s; join p of centre; r 3 d s, join last r, 6 d s, p, 6 d s, p 3 d s, join centre r; repeat last r three times, then one like the 1st r, and four like the 2d r. Edge the oval with a row of chs of 3 p 3 d s bet, joined to ps of the oval, and to the motifs on each side. Edging on ends and around the border, of chs of 3 p 2 d s bet.

NARROW BORDER. - R 3 p 2 d s bet, 6 d s; ch 3

Buttonhole the edgings on in the same way. Press and cut away the cloth. A pattern of the embroidery on this scarf can be furnished by the publishers; price 10 cents.




FIG. 33. DOILY. SEE FIGS. I AND 34, AND PAGE 12 14




FIG. 34. DOILY. SEE FIGS. I AND 33, AND PAGE 13

Draw the ch close to the sets of sts, and form the first small loop of the neck, by crossing the ch at its beginning, shuttle thread over, ball thread under the ch. Make the lattice ch of 9 sets 4-4 sts, join p left at beginning, drawing the ball thread back firmly. Draw the ball thread between the lattice, and work 2 sets 4-4 sts; draw the ball thread back, which leaves shuttle thread above, ball thread under the work. Cross the long lattice ch 2 sets below the loop for the neck. Work 2 sets 4-4 sts and a loop of 7 ps,

as the first. Work another lattice ch of 9 sets 4-4 sts, join the first lattice ch of 9 sets, two sets from the last crossing, leaving the threads on opposite sides of the work; work 2 sets 4-4 sts, and cross the lattice ch as before. Always in joining over the lattice ch draw the shuttle thread tight, so that the ball thread is double around the ch, and the shuttle thread straight through the joining. Continue until there are 60 of the 7-p loops for the neck of the collar.

2d row—Work 5 sets 4-4 sts, join the last lattice ch two sets from the last joining. Continue around the lattice edge, joining each 5 sets 4-4 sts to the centre of a lattice scallop of the last row, and keeping the work the same side up.

3d row—At the end of the collar carry threads to centre of last scallop of last row, and work back as the row before, but join with the shuttle thread.

4th row — Divide the latticework into 5 parts of 10 scallops at each end, 11 scallops to the 3, in order to leave one scallop between the points. Work each to a point, working back and forth as before; carrying threads to centre of last scallop, to leave one less on each row. Cut and sew threads at finish of each point.

Ist row around points—With neck held toward the worker, join centre of first lattice square at the right; work 2 d s, 7 p 2 d s bet; reverse, ch 6 d s; draw shuttle thread closely, and join the next lattice square, 6 d s; reverse, ch 2 d s, 7 p 2 d s bet, 2 d s, reverse, the last row. Join lattice squares as at the right side.

AROUND THE NECK.—Work 5 sets 4-4 sts, join 2d p of first small loop at the neck; work 5 sets 4-4 sts, join 2d p, opposite side of same loop, I d s, join 2d p of next loop; continue around neck. The points being finished, baste the lattice-work on the pattern right side down, firmly at the neck, leaving the other edge free, press the points out smoothly. On the pattern it will keep the shape better while joining




FIG. 35. TABLE SCARF. SEE DETAILS FIGS. 39, 40, AND PAGE 13

6 d s, join. Repeat around the 5 points, with an added scallop and two joinings at points, and skipping the extra square between points.

2d row around points—Join last ch of 7 p to last lattice square; carry threads to centre p of ch last made, work back around points with chs of 4 sets 4-4 sts, with a p in centre, and join at centre ps of last rows. Continue around the points, with an added ch at each point, and skipping the scallops between points, as in the other parts, and avoid soiling. For the rest of the collar use only No. 60 cotton.

MOTIF BETWEEN THE FRONT POINTS. (See Fig. 37.) —The clover leaf (c l) is made of a small p and 13 sets 4-4 sts, form loop crossing I d s from beginning. Ch 15 sets 4-4 sts, cross one set from first loop; repeat first loop, and work 3 sets for stem. Ch 3 d s, p, I d s, reverse; 3 d s, 12 p 2 d s bet, reverse; 12 d s, join by ball thread to p after first 3 d s. This makes the first reversed petal. Work 5 d s, p, I d s, reverse and proceed with second petal. Join the 4th p to last p of petal before. Join between 4th and 5th petals to the c l. After three more petals, ch 3 d s, join centre petal of c l, 3 d s, and continue with the seven petals reversed, as shown in Fig. 37. Join the first reversed petal at the top to the petal before. After last petal, ch 3 d s and join stem of c l.

Row around the motif — This joins to points on the collar. Work 12 sets 4-4 sts, join 2 ch between points of the collar, by ball thread. Work 12 sets more, join where this ch began. Work 7 sets, join 2d ch from last joining, 4 sets, join 11th p on first petal and 5th p on second petal together. Work 4 sets, join second scallop from last joining, 3 sets and join next two petals. Continue around motif with scallops of 7 sets, and join collar as on the first side.

MOTIF BETWEEN THE BACK POINTS.—Work p, 6 d s, p, 10 d s, reverse; 2 d s, 10 p 2 d s bet, join 1st p; making the first petal. Reverse, 6 d s, p 12 d s, reverse; 12 p 2 d s between, join p, making the second petal. Make a third petal with 14 plain d s and 14 p. Work 6 d s, p, 4 d s, then 25 p, 3 d s; form a long loop, crossing ch just past the single p. Make the large loop of 12 d s, 35 p, 4 d s; cross ch 4 d s before 1st p. The other long loop repeats the first, reversed. Make three petals as the first three, reversed. After last petal make 6 d s, join p at beginning.

Row around motif—Work 9 sets 4-4 sts, join; (on the inside of the motif) to p at close of the first long side loop; 3 sets, join p at close of third long loop, 9 sets, join at starting-point. Work 8 sets, join collar between points, 8 sets, join at starting-point. Work 8 sets, join collar at second scallop from last joining; 3 sets, join first and second petals. Continue around motif with chs long enough to clear the ps. Make one joining




FIG. 36. COLLAR. SEE DETAIL FIG. 37, AND PAGE 14




FIG. 361/2. DETAIL OF DOILY FIG. 38

on the long side loop, and two on the long centre loop.

FERNS ON THE POINTS.—Work p, 3 d s, 3 p 2 d s bet, 3 d s, join p at beginning; I d s, p, 5 d s, reverse; 2 d s, 5 p, 2 d s, form leaf by joining p at beginning. Work 2 d s, p, 6 d s, reverse; 2 d s, 6 p, 2 d s, form leaf as before, but on opposite side from the first one. Each pair of leaves increases I d s and I p each. Continue until there are five leaves on one side, six on the other, not counting the small loop at the beginning. As this is a double fern to fit around a front point, the other part is reversed, with 4 d s, p, between. Begin with 15 p, then 15 d s. Make two pairs of each size each time before decreasing the

number of sts. After joining each leaf at its base, reverse, 3 d s, p, reverse again, to bring the p on the right side to join the leaf ch. There should be II leaves on the outside, and Io on the inside. Carry threads to the first p of the first outside leaf, and work back around the outside of the two ferns with chs of 4 sets 4-4 sts, joining two leaves together. Continue, increasing the number of sets when needed, leaving a p at centre of each ch, and joining two leaves each time. At the end of the small fern join the flower motif between points of the collar at the first free scallop, after 3 sets 4-4 sts; 3 more sets, join first free scallop on lattice point; 3 sets, join first leaf on fern. Continue across ferns, joining two leaves together, as on the outside. At the neck continue with three lattice scallops to the point, Turn, work back in the same way to the fern, making the last scallop around the small end loop. Cut and sew ends. Care must be taken to have the ferns made in pairs to fit. The lattice-work has right




FIG. 37. DETAIL OF COLLAR FIG. 36

and wrong sides, and the work must be kept right side up in all parts. Therefore, begin at the end of the long fern for the opposite side, and reverse the directions.

FERNS AT SHOULDER POINTS.—They are made and joined as those described of six leaves on the inside, and seven on the outside, for the front one; and seven on each side of the one at the back of the second point. These ferns are connected by a coil made of five rows of ch—plain d s the last, of ps 3 d s bet (see Fig. 85). Work around the coils a row of lattice scallops of 2 sets 4-4 sts, p, 2 sets. Join twice on each side to the ends of the ferns.

FERNS AT THE BACK. — Made as the others, with 9 leaves on the inside, and 10 on the outside. The size of leaves is not increased after 20 d s and 20 p. A cluster of three coils joins the ferns, the upper ones oval; join them and work lattice scallops around the cluster, joining the ferns and point of the collar. Add a c l at each side, joined twice each; to the ferns, the coils, and lattice chs of the collar.

EDGING AROUND THE COLLAR.—With the exception of the neck, work 2 rows around the collar. The first, scallops of ps, varying




FIG. 38. DOILY. SEE FIG. 36¹/₂, AND PAGE 17




FIG. 39. DETAIL OF SCARF FIG. 35 FIG. 40. DETAIL OF SCARF FIG. 35

The basket is immersed in this while it is hot, the surplus syrup squeezed out, and it is ready to shape. It is very easy to color these baskets any desired shade by stirring into the liquid the necessary amount of fruit coloring. A few drops of red ink




FIG. 41. BONBON BASKET. SEE PAGE 17

ROUND COIL. - One p, ch 12 d s, join p, forming a close r. Work a row of d s and sew it around the r. The next four rows are of sets of 4-4 sts, each row sewed to position as made. Draw shuttle-thread very tight to give the crimped appearance to the ch. The last row of d s, ps 3 d s between (bet).



Figure 44. Doily. (See Detail Fig. 42.)— *Materials.*—One ball of No. 40 crochet cotton, and linen four and onequarter inches in diameter. Turn a narrow edge and finish with button-

hole or feather-stitch. The lattice border is made with continuous thread between shuttle and ball. To leave a picot at the beginning,-tie a single knot in thread between shuttle and ball; take knot between left thumb and finger, pass ball thread around the hand as usual, and (while beginning) pass shuttle thread around left little finger, and back between thumb and finger, holding those fingers together. Work 4 d s, leaving a small p between the knot and first d s, drop thread from little finger, and draw shuttle thread closely. This forms a neat p to begin with, avoids ends and is useful in making even, firm coils. In the "Tatted Cord" effect, a term, as 6 sets of 4-4 sts, would mean, work 4 single sts like the first half of a d s, then 4 single sts like the last half of a d s, six times. To join these cords, draw the ball thread under the ch, pass shuttle through the loop, draw threads so closely, that the ball thread is drawn double around the ch, and the shuttle thread is straight through the joining.

LATTICE BORDER.—Leave a p at beginning, 4 d s, 11 p 2 d s between, 3 d s. Form large loop by crossing this ch I d s from beginning. Work very closely to the loop, 6 sets of 4-4 sts; ch 2 d s, 8 small ps, I d s between (bet), 2 d s. Form a small loop, crossing at beginning of ch and joining as directed. 


Fig. 45. Pansy in Colors. See Details Fig. 46, and page 20




Fig. 46. Details of Pansy Fig. 45




FIG. 49. DETAIL OF PILLOW FIG. 47




FIG. 50. DOILY. SEE PAGE 22




FIG. 51. HATPIN. SEE PAGE 22







FIG. 52. HANDKERCHIEF CORNER. SEE PAGE 22




Fig. 54. Bonbon Basket See page 23




FIG. 55. BELT BUCKLE. SEE PAGE 24




Figure 55. Belt Buckle. — Cut from cardboard a buckle the size and shape desired and wind it with smoothedge baby ribbon; wire the cardboard if you want it very stiff. Make long ch of No. 10 crochet cotton and sew it on the buckle. To cover the centre of buckle make sets of 5-5 sts, draw the shuttle thread tight, and sew them on. For the edge of the buckle, ring 9 p, I d s between, unjoined. Sew on by first and last ps of rings and the thread between rings.




Fig. 59. Motif for Triangle No. 2, in Border. See Fig. 58




FIG. 60. FOURTH CIRCLE IN CENTRE. SEE FIG. 58




Fig. 61. Motif Centre of Triangle No. 2 in Border. See Fig. 58




Fig. 62. Insertion Defining the Octagon. See Fig. 58




FIG. 63. MEDALLION ON EDGE. SEE FIG. 58




FIG. 65. Collar. See Detail Fig. 66, and page 27




Fig. 66. Detail of Collar Fig. 65 27




Figure 68. Padded Tatting Cords.— T hese are made by using a h e a v y thread on the shuttle, a lighter one on the ball.




Fig. 68. Padded Cords. See page 28




Fig. 69. Detail of Apron Fig. 71




FIG. 70. PADDED CORDS. SEE PAGE 28

Pin the net over the tracing again with the medallions in the proper position. Tie k in thread. Make ch about 10 inches long, pin it on one of the vines to exactly the right length, tie and cut threads about $\frac{1}{2}$ inch from k. Baste ch, carefully following the tracing. Sew over and under the chain, not through it, so as not to pull it out of place. Make all the vines required, measuring and basting each one made. When all are on one end of scarf loosen from pattern and sew to the net, catching the under side of the chs, with no stitches carefully fasten the threads to the vine on the wrong side; cut ends close and sew on the ring. Press over a damp cloth, with a cloth over it, when scarf is finished. Place rings as suggested by the illustration. A stamped paper pattern of this scarf can be supplied by the publishers; price 10 cents.




Fig. 73. Jabot. See Fig. 74, and page 29




Fig. 75. Alphabet. See page 30 30




FIG. 76. DETAIL OF FIGS. 78 AND 79




FIG. 78. LIBRARY SCARF. SEE DETAILS FIGS. 76 AND 77, AND PAGE 32 31

As tatting will vary, judgment must be used in number and length of links to make the letters even. Pull them into shape while making, and press carefully afterwards. These letters are very effective on table pieces and towels.

Figure 78. Library Scarf. (See details, Figs. 76, 77.)—Use No. 3 crochet cotton. The model scarf was in écru. The tatted medallions are joined together by weaving, see Figs. 76 and 77.

MEDALLION.—* R 7 d s, 3 p 5 d s between (bet), 7 d s; ch, 4 d s, 3 p 3 d s bet, 4 d s; r 5 d s, join last p of r, 2 d s, p, 5 d s;

p or r, 2 a s, p, 5 a s; repeat ch; r 7 d s, join last p of small r, 5 d s, join mid-p in first r, 5 d s, p, 7 d s. Repeat ch and small r; repeat ch and large r, joining by mid-ps to the two other large r *. Before repeating the ch make another large r. Repeat between stars thrice, and join the first r.

CENTRE OF MEDALLION. (See Fig. 76.)—With a large needle and $1\frac{1}{4}$ yards of thread, using the 8 centre ps for foundation, weave 6 times around, close to the centre, putting the needle under 2 strands at a time, and going over again the last strand, forming a heavy r on the upper side. Finish with a Freuch knot in centre of the right side, and catch the threads down close on the wrong side. Join medallions by 2 p each, of 2 pairs of chs adjoining. Join to the linen by two chs and weaving between.

For THE WEAVING. (See Fig. 77.)—After sewing the medallions to the linen, make a 1-inch loop with the thread on the linen between them. Carry thread through the 1st p and back to the loop, join; repeat to next p, back and join; repeat around, forming ten strands, and weave over each pair back and forth, loosely but evenly.

Figure 79. Pillow with Weaving.—The materials for this pillow are the same as those used for the scarf, Fig. 78, page 31. Make the bands of insertion according to directions for the library scarf, Fig. 78, with directions on page 32. THE EDGING, FIG. 80, is made as one-fourth of a medallion, adding a joining ch of I d s, 3 p 2 d s between, I d s; and joining the scallops by 2 p of adjoining chains.

Figure 81. Edging.—R, 9 d s, p, 1 d s, p, 9 d s. Opposite r, 5 d s, p, 3 d s, p, 7 d s; ch 8 d s, p, 8




FIG. 81. EDGING. SEE PAGE 32




Fig. 79. Pillow. See Details Figs. 76. 77, and 80, and page 32

Draw up very close to r and make r of 2 d s, join last r, 9 d s, p, 4 d s, p, 5 d s, p, 7 d s; ch 7 d s; r 3 d s, join last r, 7 d s, 3 p 3 d s between, 7 d s, p, 3 d s; ch 7 d s; r 7 d s, join last r, 5 d s, p, 4 d s, p, 9 d s, p, 2 d s; r 2 d s, join last r, 8 d s, p, 1 d s, 10 d s; ch 8 d s, join opposite ch, 8 d s. Repeat the first pair of r. joining the first to mid-p of last r, and the second to mid-p of the small upper r; ch 7 d s, p, 3 d s, p, 7 d s. Repeat from the beginning.

Figure 82. Collar. (See details, Figs. 83, 84, 85, 86.)—Baste the lace net smoothly on the pattern and leave while making.

To make edge, use No. 40 crochet cotton on shuttle and No. 60 for second thread. Join threads, chain 4 d s, 9 p separated by 2 d s, 3 d s, form loop by crossing ch of stitches, I d s from beginning, shuttle thread over, ball thread under ch. Draw shuttle thread close,

continue with 2 d s, 7 p separated by 2 d s, 5 d s, 9 p separated b y 2 d s, form another loop. Repeat, making length

to reach

around collar, neck included. Press this edge flat with warm iron; baste on edge of collar, placing it with outer edge of scallops even with edge of net. Sew to net all around collar with fine thread.

The next row is joined to 2 ps between scallops of last row, being careful to take in edge of net. Work five sets of 5-5 stitches to each scallop, after joining leave a p when beginning next scallop. Omit around the neck.

Last row—Join to ps between scallops of row just made. Work 7 p 2 d s between (bet), join to next p between scallops.

SOLID COILS. (See Fig. 85.) —Wind No. 40 cotton around shuttle a few times. Tie a single knot in thread, between shuttle and ball. Take knot between thumb and finger, shuttle thread towards you. Pass ball thread around hand as usual and, for convenience, while beginning work, pass shuttle thread around little finger and back between thumb and finger. Work 12 d s, leaving a short p between the knot and first st. Now drop thread from little finger and draw shuttle thread through sts to the knot at beginning of the coil. Continue d s, drawing shuttle thread tight so as to form the coil as worked. Hold closely, making the open space left in centre as small as possible. When two rows are worked, it will be easier if each row is sewed in place, as made. In last row of coil leave a p after each 3d d s.

Scrolls are begun in same manner as coils, but left open, with a p at each 5 d s, after the first 12 d s.

Clover leaves are made of the cross loops of more or less p in number in same manner as edge of collar. Roses. (See Fig. 86.)—Number 40 cotton, make a

ROSES. (See Fig. 86.) — Number 40 cotton, make a ring of 24 p separated by $1\frac{1}{2}$ d s. Close, making a r as small as possible. Carry the thread to 1st p, join ball thread, work ch, 7 p 2 d s bet, join in same p. Carry the threads to 4 p from last joining, repeat ch, join as before. Continue around r, making six loops, which forms first row of petals. Carry the threads to p at left of first petal, work 3 d s, 11 p 2 d s bet, of rose opposite first set; sew the 2d p in scroll to p between next two petals of rose. Make third set of scrolls, join the 2d p of scroll to the next space between petals of rose and join at 3d p to centre of next rose petal; ch 3 p, 6 d s, join mid-p of next upper rose petal; ch 3 p, join 5th p on first scroll; ch 3 p, join next 3d p of scroll; ch 3 p, 12 d s, join centre of rose as did the first scroll. Make other half of set in same manner.

With No. 60 ball thread and No. 40 shuttle thread work two rows scallops around whole motif, making scallops of 7 p 2 d s bet, and joining at convenient intervals to work already made, to keep shape of pattern. Join second row to p between scallops of first




FIG. 82. COLLAR IN TATTING APPLIQUÉ ON NET, AND JABOT. SEE DETAILS FIGS. 83, 84, 85, AND 86, AND PAGE 32

3 d s, join to 1st p at right of first petal. Repeat all around for second row of petals. Carry the threads to remaining p between petals of second row, 3 d s, 17 p separated by 2 d s, 3 d s, join p between next two petals. Repeat all around, join last petal to same p as first petal, make four roses. Small flat crocheted balls are used for the centre of roses.

HEART-SHAPED MOTIF ON SHOULDER. — Cut paper pattern. Baste rose in centre. Make three sets of scrolls as before described, with 6 d s between p, 8 p in each scroll. Join one set of scrolls between petals of rose toward point of pattern. Make coil of three rows, join between the scrolls at point of pattern. Another set of scrolls of 9 p meeting between petals row, changing the size of scallops to fit evenly. CRESCENT-SHAPED MOTIF AT BACK. — Cut paper pattern of crescent 5 inches in length from point to point, and 2¼ inches deep in centre. Baste rose in centre of pattern. Make two coil wheels thus: A coil of three rows, last row having a p after each 4th d s, making 9 p around coil. After sewing rows in place, join threads to 1st p made; turn, work 7 d s close to joining, 7 p 2 d s bet, 3 d s, form loop by crossing ch at 3 d s from 1st p; work 4 d s, join ball thread to next p on coil; continue around coil.

Baste these wheels on each side of rose. Sew two loops of wheel to two outside petals of rose. For clover-leaf (c l) scroll at each end, begin scroll as

before, making a p after each 6 d s. At 4th p join third loop on crescent wheel from loop joined to the rose. At next p of scroll join next loop on wheel I p from centre. Work 6 d s, p, I2 d s, 9 p 2 d s bet, 3 d s, form first leaf of clover by crossing ch at point 3 d s from Ist p. Work I2 d s, I7 p 2 d s bet, 3 d s, form second and third leaves like first. Make opposite scroll like first one, join opposite scroll, also at loop on other side of centre one, and also the next loop, as in first scroll. At top of rose; join at 3d p to first loop in wheel from rose; 4 p 6 d s bet, bring end of scroll to rose between petals at top, the opposite one finishing at same point.

At bottom of rose make two more scrolls, each joining at second and third p of scroll to p

at side of two petals of rose. After making four more p and 6 d s, with shuttle thread make tiny r, joining second p of scroll and petal of rose, ch 3 ps, 12 d s, bring ch to centre of petal at bottom as at top of rose and finish ends. Work all around motif a row of scallops and loops, join ps of work already made, making the loops larger or smaller as required. Work another row of scallops around outside of last

row, joining between scallops of last row. CLOVER-LEAF, COIL, AND SCROLL MOTIF. (See Figs. 82,

83.) —Make coil of three rows, making p at each 3d d s of last row of coils, scroll of 12 d s, 9 p, with 5 d s between, 7th p joined to a p on coil, 12 d s after last p. Leaf of 21 p, 2 d s between, followed by 12 d s. Middle leaf of 25 p, 12 d s, and third leaf like first. Nine d s joined to last p made in scroll, finish as on opposite side.

Six motifs are required of this size, also six more made in same manner, except that the two side leaves of the clover have 19 instead of 21 p. Sew a second smaller coil to two of the larger motifs for extreme ends of collar.


The motif above crescent at back has a coil, in centre of two sets of scrolls with which are made fiveleaf clovers, first leaf having 15 p, sccond leaf 11 p, centre leaf 17 p.

The six coils around bottom of crescent are graduated in size, having two, three, and four rows. The other four separate coils having 4 rows each, and all separate coils having 2 d s between ps instead of 3 like those attached to motifs.

Before sewing to net, place all work on flannel, right side down, cover with damp cloth, press with

hot iron, then baste to position through both net and paper pattern; then with No. 100 thread sew around all edges to net, also through the centre of large motifs, fasten each centre end of coil and scroll through the small p at the beginning of each.

ROSEBUDS AND STEMS FOR JABOT. (See Fig. 84.) — Make chains of sets of stitches, drawing shuttle thread close enough to twist






Fig. 86. First Row of Rose in Collar Fig. 82. See Fig. 83

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slightly, then at end of chains a cluster of four loops for petals with ps around edge, longer at centre of loops. Make small crocheted balls, fill with cotton, sew in centre of petal cluster, catch petals around the ball. A second cluster of petals may be made, having four loops, giving the effect of a bud opening. Sew stems to under side of rose to join ends of collar in front.

By sewing a row of narrow lace inside of tatted edge around neck, the collar will be protected and improved.

Figure 87. Change Purse. Materials. — One ball of white crochet silk, a bunch of steel beads No. 9, and an ivory ring.

String four or five hundred beads on ball thread; this is as many as can be conveniently handled in working, more may be added. Fill shuttle from same ball, slipping the beads along as the shuttle is filled. Tie a single knot in silk, and make a p at the beginning. Full directions will be found on page 19, Fig. 44, and also for making sets of stitches.

TOP OF PURSE. — Work one set of 5-5 sts, p, I set with p at centre, to turn downward opposite

the first p; draw shuttle thread tight; work 2 sets of 5-5 sts without a p; 2 sets with p at beginning and centre of each set, making 2 p on each side of cord. Work 2 sets without p, then 2 sets with p. Continue until there are 12 spaces between ps and 11 pairs of p on each side of the cord. Work 1 set with p at beginning and centre, join the p at beginning of the work. This is the twelfth pair of p, and completes the circle at the opening of the purse.

Carry threads to 1st p at right of joining.

Ist row - * Work 3 d s, p, 3 d s, a p of 3 beads ;-slip the beads close to the last sts ;---3 d s, p, 3 d s; join 1st p on ch. Work I d s. p with one bead, 1 d s, join 2d p of same pair on ch *. Repeat between stars around, and first scallop. 2d row -

Carry threads to p on side of




FIG. 87. CHANGE PURSE. SEE PAGE 35

first scallop; repeat the first row, but with 4 d s.

3d, 4th, and 5th rows—Like the second row.

The next four rows are alike; of I set 5-5 sts, p, 2 sets 4-4 sts, p of 3 beads, 2 sets 4-4 sts, p, I set 5-5 sts, join side p of scallop; bar of I d s, p of I bead, I d s; join side p of next scallop.

The next four rows are like the first, but with 5 d s between side ps and centre.

The next row closes the bottom of the purse. Hold the two sides together and join the ps of both at the same time, with sets of sts and bar as in four middle rows. Turn, and work back across the six scallops of the bottom, 5 sets of 4-4 sts and a p of 3 beads in the centre, to each scallop and a 3-beaded p between scallops.

Work the last row with 3 sets 4-4 sts, p of 12 beads, 3 sets 4-4 sts; join at beaded p between scallops, and leave there a p of 12 beads.

TO FINISH THE TOP OF PURSE. —Join back, left side, 1st pair of p, upper side of cord. Work around the purse one row like the first row after the top circle. Work a second row across back

of sets 4-4 sts. After the sixth scallop turn and work back, making 5 sets with a beaded p at centre; join between scallops of last row without the beaded connection. Carry threads to beaded p at top of last scallop made, work 2 sets 4-4 sts, p of 3 beads, 2 sets 4-4 sts, join beaded p of next scallop, work across, joining to the beaded p of each scallop, which diminishes the number of scallops by one. Next row back, work over each scallop and join be-




FIG. 88. DESIGN FOR SERVING TRAY. SEE PAGE 36

tween scallops. Carry thread to beaded p at top of scallop, work across, join beaded ps as before. Each row from left to right has one less scallop, but from right to left the number is the same as the row before. Continue until scallops are worked off to one. Tie and sew ends.

Beginning at side of **poi**nt, work row of scallops around point of 2 sets 4-4 sts, a p of 3 beads, 2 sets 4-4 sts, join and repeat. On front side at top of purse work loop extending across two scallops, the ends of which are joined to cord, for convenience in opening purse.

CROCHET CORDS. — With hook join to ivory ring. Chain 50 sts, join to one side of purse at beginning of point. Ch 50, join to ring, ch 50, with hook draw the ch from back side of purse through the small space left between first and second scallops, of the row worked all around top of purse. With the hook join to the corresponding connection on front side of purse. Work a few sts, then draw this short ch and thread back through same space as entered and

continue ch to ring. Repeat until all the spaces across purse are used and join last ch to extreme side of purse, as in beginning. There should be 7 sets of cords to ring, the last one ending at ring. Fill remainder of ring with double crochet and sew ends securely.

Figure 88. Tatting for Serving Tray. — Made with No. 30 crochet cotton.

CENTRAL MEDALLION. — With continuous thread. Central ring—7 d s, p, 7 d s, next r, ch, p, 2 p 3 d s between (bet), join p of r, p, 2 p 3 d s bet, fasten at base of r.

1st row—Leave 1/4 inch, r 3 d s, join base of central r, 3 d s; ch 2 p 3 d s bet, repeat, join rs at ps and top of r, and last at base of rs.

2d row—Ch 12 d s, 4 p 3 d s bet; double r, inside 7 d s, p, 7 d s; outside, ch 7 d s, join nearest p of 1st row, 2 d s, join p of r, 2 d s, join p of 1st row, 7 d s, join base of r. Ch 4 p 3 d s bet, 12 d s, join base of r in 1st row, repeat, joining chs of 12 d s to last ps of chs before p before the last chs. Cut threads and sew on the under side.

3d row-R, 9 d s, join 1st p after ch of 12 d s; 3 d s,

join next p, 9 d s, close; ch 5 d s, p, 2 d s, p, 7 d s, p, 2 d s, p, 7 d s, p, 2 d s, p, 5 d s; r 9 d s, join 2d p after double r, 3 d s, join 3d p, 9 d s, close; ch 5 d s, p, 2 d s, p, 7 d s, p, 2 d s, p, 5 d s. Repeat rs and chs.

4th row—Rs all of 4 d s, join, 3 d s, join, 4 d s; each joined to a pair of ps of the last row. Chs, all of 3 or 5 p, 2 d s bet; 3 p over rs, 5 p over chs.

5th row—R 5 d s, join at the point, 2d ch of 5 p, join mid-p, 5 d s; ch 3 p 2 d s bet; r 4 d s join last p same ch, 2 d s, join next p, 4 d s; ch 3 p 2 d s bet, r 3 d s, join last p same ch, 2 d s join next p, 3 d s; ch 2 p 2 d s bet; r 3 d s


FIG. 89. TATTED BAG. SEE PAGE 36

No. 10 crochet cotton or silk. SMALL MEDALLIONS. — R, 3 p 2 d s between (bet); very close, r 13 p 2 d's bet; push small r inside of large one, join at base; ch 4 d s. Repeat thrice, join and close. Join shuttle thread to 2d p of large r, make around it six r of 3 p 2 d s bet. Make two such medallions; then two more, the same, except that on three sides there are but 5 outer rs, the centre one of 9 p 2 d s bet. The centre medallion is the same, except there is a double r in place of large single r, of 13 p 2 d s bet, around which make 5 rs, 9 p 2 d s bet. The end medallions are placed squarely, the others diagonally.

To fill between medallions and straighten the work,








FIG. 90. DOILY WITH CORONATION CORD. SEE PAGE 37




FIG. 911/2. DETAIL OF BAG FIG. 91




FIG. 91. BAG IN BEADED TATTING. SEE DETAIL NO. 91¹/₂, and page 37

2d row—Join, first b p; ch 3 d s, p with 6 b, 3 d s, join next p and repeat. 3d row—Like 2d. 4th row— Use the thread with mixed b, making the blue and white ps alternately. 5th row—Blue b. 6th row— Mixed b. 7th and 8th rows—White. 9th row—Mixed. 10th to 13th rows—Blue. 14th row—Mixed. 15th and 16th rows—White. 17th row—Mixed. 18th row— Blue. 19th row—Mixed. 20th to 22d rows—White.

23d row—White. This row reaches only half way and contains 23 ps.

24th row—Mixed. Join threads into first p of last row and make 22 ps. 25th row—Blue, 21 ps. 26th row—Blue, 20 ps. 27th row—Mixed, 19 ps. 28th row —White, 18 ps. 29th row—White, 17 ps. Finish the other half in the same way.

Tie the thread into the top of the p in the 22d row, which is exactly at the side of the bag and ch 6 d s; make a long beaded p, using a piece of cardboard $2\frac{3}{4}$ inches long as a measure and twist the thread so that the beaded thread will twist when the p is made; ch 3 d s, and join through the top of the two successive ps in the 23d row. Repeat till there are 8 long twisted ps, then make 3 d s, p, 3 d s in the chs across the bottom, joining the two sides together.

Now returning to the top, make a row like the first one joining the rs to those in the first row, with white b ps. *2d row*—Blue b. Join into top of a white p in last row and ch 5 d s, p, with 5 b, 5 d s, join to next p, p with 5 b over joining; repeat to end of row. Fasten all ends on back of work with No. 100 thread.

The cord is the d ch (see Fig. 110) made with 3 strands of padding cotton No. 5 on the shuttle, and two strands of the No. 50 with blue beads on the upper, and white ones on the lower thread. Holding the three threads between left thumb and finger with the heavy thread between the other two, pass the

upper and lower threads around the fingers, being careful that they do not cross, but lie a little apart.

Now take the middle shuttle in the right hand, and with the thumb and finger slip the lower thread off the fingers, without loosening the left thumb and finger, and draw it back under the left thumb where it is held out of the way while an ordinary d s is made with the upper thread. Now slip the under thread back over the fingers and make a d s with it. Make the last half of this d s, as ordinarily made, first and draw it tight with the right hand, then make the first part of the stitch. Continue making d s, first with the upper and then the lower thread, till the cord is about a foot long, then make ps of 3 b each, separated by 5 d s on either side, until you have made another foot, then another foot plain. Make two of these cords, double the beaded part in the centre and tie with loops. Also tie a knot in the doubled cord below the beaded part. Draw the ends of one cord through the upper row of rings in the bag; the other through the lower row, and join the ends. The bag may be lined or used unlined, as desired.

Figure 92. Beaded Necklace. (See Detail, Fig. 93.) *Materials.*—One bunch No. o gold and one bunch No. o bronze beads, one string No. o pearl beads, two brilliants, clasp, and No. 40 crochet cotton.

String beads on ball thread in following order: I bronze (b), I gold (g), 4 b, I g, I pearl (p), I g, 4 b, I g, 2 b, I g, 6 b, I g, 3 b; this is for one section of necklace. Repeat for each section, then add I b, I g, 4 b, I g, I p, I g, 4 b, I g, I b. The necklace is begun and ended with the long loop, making 30 long loops, a pendant in front, and 30 scallops at top of necklace.




FIG. 94. NECKLACE IN BEADED TATTING. SEE DETAIL FIG. 95, AND PAGE 39

Push beads along on thread and fill shuttle from same ball. Begin work as described in Fig. 94. Long loops—Work 15 d s, bringing the sts close to the knot; draw thread through sts to the knot; make a beaded picot by slipping first three beads (I b, I g, I b) close to sts already made, continue with 5 d s, then a beaded picot of 9 beads, having the p bead in the centre; work 5 d s; another beaded picot like first

one; 12 d s, draw shuttle thread close through whole ch and form long loop of this chain by crossing it 2 d s from the beginning, ball thread under, shuttle thread over the ch. Continue with 3 d s, a beaded picot of 1 b; repeat twice, 3 d s, picot, 6 d s, a beaded picot of 3 beads (I b, I g, 1 b), 6 d s and form loop as before, crossing at beginning of ch.

To make the scallop over last loop, continue from crossing, 4 d s, beaded picot of I b 3 d s, another b picot, 3 d s, a beaded picot of 3 beads as before; repeat first half of scallop, carry this ch over top of last loop, and join to the plain picot of that loop. This completes one section. At one end of necklace sew one section of the clasp in place, then with same thread fasten I g bead, I p, and I g in open space in small loop; repeat in

Figure 94. Tatted Necklace. (See Detail, Fig. 95.) - It is hard to realize that this handsome necklace is made with the tatting shuttle. The materials required are No. 40 crochet cotton, 1 bunch No. 6 steel beads, I bunch jet beads a little larger, I string No. 2 pearl beads, and a clasp.

String a quantity of beads (b) on ball thread: I black (b) to two steel (s).

Fill shuttle from same ball, slipping b back on ball. Ch 2 d s, then 4 sets 4-4 sts (see Explanations on page 3). Work I d s, p, I d s; repeat the four sets of sts, I d s, draw shuttle thread close, form a loop of this ch of sts by crossing ch I d s from beginning, shuttle thread over, and ball thread under ch, work I d s, slip the b along, work one set of 4-4 sts, make a b p, using I b between 2 s. Work one set of 5-5 sts, another b p, another set of 5 sts, another b p, and a set of five sts, I d s. Carry this ch around side of the loop first made and join to p at end of loop. Make next loop as first, except I d s before half sts instead of two in beginning, and join by crossing the ch close to first loop, make b ch as before.

Continue to length required, then make b ch of sts as before, carry around other side of loop last made and join between that loop and next one back. Work back whole length of necklace, joining each b ch between loops. Have an even number of loops in the necklace. Fasten off ends at first end of work and sew the clasp for fastening to each end.





FIG. 95. DETAIL OF NECKLACE FIG. 94. FULL SIZE




FIG. 97. BABY BONNET. SEE PAGE 40




FIG. 98. TATTED MOTIF. SEE PAGE 40




FIG. 101. BABY BONNET. SEE FIG. 99, AND PAGE 41




FIG. 103. DETAIL OF FIG. 102





Ch 13 d s, r 3 p, join between 2d and 3d rs in next scallop. Repeat ch r, ch, and large r, join 4th p to centre p in 4th r of scallop. Cut and tie threads. Begin at other side of large med and repeat directions. After last large r, turn, ch 5 d s, I p, 5 d s, r 3 p 2 d s bet, join centre p at base of large r, ch 6 p 2 d s bet, r 3 p 2 d s bet, join at base of small r in previous row in which to run the cord and on which are the figures to finish the top of the bag. To make the sides of the bag even at side of small med, join threads at base of small r joined to a large r and alternate rs and chs to base of large r on the other side of smallmed. This completes one side of the bag, the sides may be tatted or sewed together. The med above and below the centre are sewed on.

TATTED CORD.—Wind several yards of thread double, to make a heavy cord; join to a figure like those at bottom of bag. Ch 5 d s, sm p, 5 d s. Continue to the desired length, run through the top of the bag, join another figure, turn, ch 4 d s join p on ch, ch 4 d s, join; continue the length of the ch. Do not draw the shuttle thread too tight, to keep the ch straight.

Tie the 3 threads together, the heavy thread in the middle; hold the knot with left thumb and finger. Pass the lighter threads around the left fingers a little apart. Ch I d s with the upper thread, turn the work *toward* you, half way around; ch I d s, with the lower thread, turn back *from* you; ch I d s. Have 2 d s on each side between beads.




FIG. 107. DETAIL OF COLLAR, FIG. 106 44




FIG. 108. BAG. SEE DETAIL FIG. 109, AND PAGE 42




FIG. 109. DETAIL OF BAG, FIG. 108

Now pass the free end of wire downward through centre of rose, pull-

Bubs. - First make crocheted ball as for rose, finishing it with wire stem, winding enough thread around wire end to resemble the bulb at base of a rosebud. Chain 4 d s, beaded p, plain p, alternating until there are 4 b p, 3 plain p, graded in length, the first and last being 1/8 inch, the centre one 1/4 inch in length, 4 b p and 3 d s. Bring ends of ch together, pass shuttle thread over, ball thread under at point of ch, I d s from beginning. Draw shuttle thread close. work 2 d s to hold ch in form of petal. LEAF CLUSTER.—Cut two pieces wire each 6 in. in length, and one piece 8 in. long. Cover these wires closely with double crochet with No. 60 cotton, leaving $\frac{1}{2}$ in. wire at each end of the shorter pieces; and $\frac{1}{2}$ in. on the longer piece for stem.

TATTED EDGE OF LEAF.—Join threads at beginning of crochet covering, work 3 d s, 3 p separated by




FIG. 111. Cords and Trimmings in Beaded Tatting. See page 43

I d s, 3 d s, join to third or fourth st from first joining. (This depends on how closely the crochet is done), repeat all around or the length of each covered wire. Bring the ends of each wire together at beginning of covering and wind to cover ends of threads.

TATTED CENTRE OF LEAVES.—String on shuttle thread 50 beads. Take thread between thumb and finger of left hand, slip 6 b up close before passing thread around hand. Work 2 d.s, 3 b p with I p between, 2 d s, I p, 2 d s, 3 b p I p between, 2 d s, join, draw closely.

Carry thread upward through end of ring, slip as many beads as will fill open space in r, join to centre p of r. Make 4 r in this manner, each being made close to the one preceding it. Increase number of beads in 2d and 3d r to 8, and in 4th r decrease to 6, as in 1st r. Sew ends of this ch of r to ends of wire leaves on under side, also the plain p on sides of r to the sides of the leaves.

A r r ange the three sections in form of cluster of rose leaves. Wind wires together for stem. Group three roses, two buds, and leaf cluster prettily, and wind all stems together as compactly and smoothly a s

possible. One or two long wire hairpins may be twisted among the stems to hold ornament in the hair, and the leaves made to cover pins.

Narrow off by skipping each fourth st until closed, stuff




FIG. 113. INSERTIONS IN PADDED TATTING. See page 44

body when nearly closed. Body, including head, should be $1\frac{1}{2}$ inches in length.

Wings. — Use milliner's fine covered wire for foundation. For the larger wings cut wire 18 in., and for smaller wings, 12 in. in length. Make a sharp bend at centre of longer wire, which place a little below the head on crochet body, fasten temporarily while shaping on either side of body, bring ends of wire together, lap 1/3 in. under body about $\frac{1}{2}$ in. lower than centre of wire. Make slight bend in centre of shorter wire, bring ends around to centre in long loops, lap as before, fasten to centre bend to form smaller wings. After fastening ends of both wires, bend them into proper shape for the outline of each pair of wings, then remove from body and leave ends free while covering wire, it will be found much easier. Cover wire of both pairs of wings very closely with No. 60 crochet cotton in d c.

TATTED EDGE. — Join threads about $\frac{1}{2}$ in. from end of wire to crochet cover, 2 d s, 3 p separated by I d s, 2 d s, centre p longer than others, join to 4th st on wire from first joining. Continue around both pairs of wings.

Now make 8 tatted coils; wind thread a few times around shuttle, but do not disconnect.




FIG. 114. ROSE SPRAY IN BEADED TATTING FOR HAIR. SEE PAGE 45

Take doubled end of thread between thumb and forefinger of left hand, pass ball thread around left hand, hold firmly the doubled end while with shuttle thread work a few d s, then draw shuttle thread through tightly, and thus form the centre of coil. Continue d s, drawing shuttle thread tight enough to make coil, with thumb and finger as sts are made, work three rows of d s from centre of coil, then one row, having a p after each third d s, cut threads, hold coil firmly and with fine thread sew ends on under side of coil, and around coil to hold rows in place.

The two coils nearest the body should have four rows before the p row to make them larger.

Smaller Wings. -Make 2 coils like those for larger wings, but continue with the stem, which leads from them through centre of wings thus: After sewing the coils in; ch 6 half sts like the first half of a d s, p, and 6 half sts like the last half of a d s. Continue until long enough to reach end of wings next to body. With a little help from thumb and finger the p thus made will fall alternately on each side of the centre, making a pretty double p cord. Now lap and fasten ends of wires of both pairs of wings. Sew coils to position by their

p to crocheted covering of wire on under side. The ch of r from coils on edge of the large wings to centre coils, are made as follows: With shuttle thread make r of 2 d s, 17 p separated by I d s, 2 d s, close, make lock-stitch at close of each r thus: Draw loop of shuttle thread under ball thread, pass shuttle through loop, draw close, carry thread through centre of r just made on under side of r and join to centre p of same r. Proceed as before, making 4 r, each 2 p smaller than the one

preceding. Make six of these chs of rs, sew the ends to centre coils, and also coils to edge of wings as illustrated. Make two more chs of rs as follows:

String a quantity of small jet beads on shuttle thread; r of 2 d s, 4 p separated by 2 d s, 2 d s, slipping a bead into each p as made, on one side of r, also as many beads as will fill the thread through centre of r. Join these jetted r to coil in lower corner of large wings, and to wired edge in form of 1/4 circle. Make two separate r for each wing to fill open spaces and sew to position. Also with fine thread tack lightly across ch of rs on under side to hold in place.

Fasten sets of wings together by placing where wires are lapped, sew to under side of body.

ANTENNÆ.— These are made in same manner as the coils, having a black bead on thread at beginning, and drawing shuttle join cord, 2 d s, p, 3 d s. Ch 2 d s, p, 2 d s; repeat from *. SMALL WHEELS.—Cut 30 sections of cord, I d s, join cord, * 2 d s, join cord. Repeat from * I3 times, I d s, close. There will be 15 loops of cord. Around this make a row of loops and chs; r 3 d s, p, 3 d s, join to cord, 3 d s, p, 3 d s; ch 4 d s, p, 2 d s, p, 4 d s. Join rings to cord and sew ends of cord to 2d p of last r. Join p on last 3 chs to ps of ch on large wheel (w). Join small ws together by

3 chs. Make 9 small ws. HALF WHEEL AT TOP CORNER.—Cut 14 sections of cord. Make same as small ws, forming into a half w and joining to two small ws at corner. Finish top of half w with 5

chs. Repeat at the other corner. This makes one side of bag. EDGE.-R 6 d s, p, 6 d s. Ch 6 d s, join to p in ch of w, 2 d s, join to next p in ch of w, 6 d s; repeat r twice, joining together. Alternate the rs and chs around the top. Repeat, joining rs of this row to those of last row, so as to make groups of four rs between chs. Cord. -Take seven 31/2yard lengths of cotton, twist tightly, double and twist again.

Cover Design. -On page 21, Fig. 48, is one - half square used in pillow, Fig. 47, which shows a section of the cover design. Make 1/2 of the square as directed for the pillow, and the corners at 3/4ths. At the end of row I, instead of "repeat ch," ch 5 d s, 3 p 3 d s between (bet), 5 d s, and continue with row 2. After last
