
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

On the transfer there will be a group of autumn leaf motifs. These are suitable for pillow slips, guest towels, scarf, hankies and many other items.

The quilt, or rather quilts of the month will be found here also—and feature wreaths of appliqued leaves.

The dainty sugar and creamer panholders are in single crecket, and besides these you will also receive direc-



tions for the lacy looking shawl which is quickly done in knot stitch. For good measure we include a group of patriotic



lapel charms—these are crochet, too, and require only a few yards of material.

Blazing Star Bedspread

MATERIAL: 30 (500 yd.) bails or skeins of No. 20 White or Ecru mescerized crocket cotton will make a bod-spread about 90x100. 12-15 yds. are required for one star motif. Use a number 9 crecket hook.

STAR MOTIF: ch 12 making 1st st 3 times usual size, dtr in long st, (ch 3, dtr in same long st) 10 times, ch 3, sl st in 4th of next ch (counting from 1st dtr).

2nd row: ch 1, (4 se ever next 3-ch, se in dtr) 11 times, 4 sc ever 3-ch, si st in 1st 1-ch.

3rd row: * ch 19, sl st in same place. (ch 6, sl st in 5th st from hook for a p) 6 times, ch 1, sl st at base of 2nd p from hook, ** ch 5, sl st in same place, ch 1, a 2-dc-cluster at base of next p, ch 5, sl st in top of cluster for a p, ch 1, a 2-tr-cluster at base of next p, a p, (ch 1, a 2-dtr-cluster at base of next p, a p) twice, ch 1, sl st in next 10th sc on center circle. ** Repeat from * 5 times. Fasten off. Make a 2nd Starthrough Row 2, then finish as follows to join to first star.

Ch 19, sl st in same st, * (ch 6, p)
5 times, ch 3, sl st in tip of one point
of 1st motif, ch 2, sl st back in 2nd st
of 3-ch, ch 1, sl st at base of next
p. Repeat from ** to **. * Ch 15,
sl st in 5th st from book for a p, (ch



5, p) twice, ch I, sI st in next ch-loop of 1st motif, (ch 5, p) 3 times, ch I, sk all 6 ps, sI st in next ch st, ch 9, sI st in same sc on center. Repeat from * to * in this row to join next point to the next point on 1st motif (see illustration). Then complete motif as for 1st one. Three stars have been joined in the illustration to show how small pieces may be made from this motif.


Make and join 35 motifs in a straight row for width of spread. The next row, and every other row thereafter will have 36 motifs. Each motif in all succeeding rows is joined to those of preceding row as it is worked. When completed the star motifs will be in a straight line across the top and bottom of spread, with one point free, while along the sides every other star will be lower than the others, forming scallops. Stars at corners and along sides of spread will have two free points. About 42 rows are required for the length of spread.


EDGE: Join thread to 1st of two free points on one corner motif of spread, working toward a scalloped side first. Ch 14, tr in next ch-loop, ch 14, sc in mext point, ch 14, tr in next ch-loop, ch

13, tr in joining of next two points, * ch 13, tr in next ch-loop on next motif, ch 14, sc in next point, ch 14, tr in next ch-loop, ch 14, sc in next point, ch 14, tr in next ch-loop, ch 13, tr in next joining point, ch 13, tr in next ch-loop, ch 13, tr in next ch-loop, ch 13, tr in next joining point. Repeat from * across entire side. On the ends work in same manner—there will be only two 14 chs on each star with two 13 chs at joining points. Continue all around and close with sl st.

2nd row: ch 5, sl st in last sc for a p, (5 sc, p, 5 sc, p and 5 sc over next 14-ch) twice, sc in sc, a p, (5 sc, p, 5 sc, p and 5 sc) over next 14-ch, ** (4 sc, p and 10 sc) over next 13-ch, 7 sc over next 13-ch, ch 12 and fasten back in 4th se from last p, (4 sc, p, 3 sc, p, 3 sc, p and 4 sc) over 12-ch, (4 sc, p and 3 sc) over remainder of 13-ch, ** (5 sc, p, 5 sc, p and 5 sc) over next 14-ch, se in sc, a p, (5 sc, p, 5 sc, p and 5 sc over next 14-ch) twice, sc in sc, a p, (5 sc, p, 5 sc, p and 5 sc) over next 14-ch. Repeat from ** to ** twice. Repeat across sides and work over ends to correspond.

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Round the Clock With the Littlest Bear

Recess, lunch, studytime and walking home with Miss Lucy Bear occupy the littlest bear's next hours. Then comes playtime and helping with supper. After supper, we'll let you in on a secret—it isn't long until the littlest bear is so sleepy he has to go to bed.

The story of the littlest bear is told in 12 amusing single stitch and outline motifs given on transfer C9163, 10c, for making the cunning cribspread shown.

C9163M, 35c, brings the twelve 9-inch blocks of this crib quilt already stamped on soft white material.


Nine-Patch Star

If you are careful in your choice of print for C, you will find a surprise eight-pointed star around the square containing the four-pointed B star. This will require a print that is not too dainty.

Piece first the nine-patch; add to it the 4 C pieces. Make 4 sections of B and D pieces and join these corners to sides as illustrated. Quilt along seams. A border of one or more colors may be added if desired.

You will need about 5 yards white, 1 1/3 yards print, and 43/4 yards plain color.

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Crochet Dish Mitt

15 yards of color. Use a No. 5 hook.

With string, chain (ch) 4, close with slip stitch (sl st) to form ring. Ist round (rnd): ch 4, I double crochet (dc) on ring, * ch 1, 1 dc on ring, repeat from * 8 more times. Ch I and close ends of rnd with a sl st into 3rd st of 4 ch at beginning.



You will need about 150 yards of string, around. This makes a rnd with 2 dc on every other I-ch.

Crochet Dish Pad

The disk pad requires about 135 yards of string and 20 yards of color. Use a No. 5 hook.

FRONT: With string ch 4, sl st in 1st st of ch to form ring. 1st rad: ch 4, * 1 de on

ring, ch I, repeat from * 8 more times, close end of rnd with sl st into 3rd st of 4 ch at beginning. 2nd rnd: sl st on 3 ch at beginning (which makes 1st de) as for mitt, * che 19, sc on next dc, repeat from * all around, sl st on 1st 1-eh of precious de rnd and work the 3rd rad, with 2 dc and I ch between on each I-ch of 1st de rnd.

4th rnd: same as 2nd with more loops. to end of cuff near mitt. 5th rew: se back 5th rnd: ch 4, * 1 de on same 1-ch, ch 1, to outer end. 6th rew: sc back to mitt and I do en next I-ch, ch I, I do on next I-ch, si st on mext I-ch of mitt, repeat from * repeat from * all around. 6th rnd: same as

> With color, work 9th rnd of de with 1 ch between, having 2 dc on every 4th 1-ch, 10th rnd: with color, same as 2nd. 11th rnd: with string, work a rnd of I dc with eh I between, having 2 dc in every 7th 1-ch. 12th rnd: with string, same as 2nd.

> The back of pad is worked exactly the same as front, but is all of string.

Fit the front and back together, pin at intervals. To join, with color, fasten in corresponding 1-ch's of both front and back, ch 10, sc in next 1-ch, going through both front and back each time. Continue all around pad. SI st in I-ch with beginning 10 ch, then ch 16, sl st back in same 1-ch and work 20 sc over 16 ch to make ring for hanging.

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Knit Shoe Bag

These bags may be easily and quickly made in odd moments even by beginners at knitting, as only the simplest stitches are employed. Mercerized crochet cotton labout the weight of string) is used, and any desired color may be chosen. If you have left-over bits of such thread on hand in several colors, you might prefer to stripe your shoe bags. Plain string may even be used for the bags if desired.



Using 4 needles no longer than number 2, cast on 92 sts, knit beginning of each needle very tightly to avoid a drop stitch effect, work plain for 3/4 inch. Purl I and. Knit plain for II inches, then begin narrowing at 4 points by knitting 2 sts together every 23rd st. Next rnd: knit 2 together on each side of each point where 2 were knit together in last rnd (8 decreases in rnd). Repeat in all rnds until only 4 sts remain. Weave these sts together to close point.

A hem at top is turned back to the purled rnd and whipped down to form

casing for two draw cords which may match or contrast with color of bag. Ribbon or regular cord may be used for this, or a twisted cord may be made of the thread used in knitting the bag. Make each cord about 18 inches long.

Initials may be put on in straight stitches or chain stitch, following a row of knitting for straight lines. These may be of any shape and size desired (on the model they were about 11/4 inches long.) A panel may be used or not as preferred.

To dry knit garments quickly, place a window screen out-of-doors on chairs so that the air can circulate freely under the frame. Cover with clean papers so no possible rust or dust from it will soil the garments. Then just lay the knit or crochet garments on it to dry. Heavy garments which usually take two or three days to dry will dry easily in one day on the screen wire.

Before putting screens away for the winter, dust and paint. Paint will be thoroughly dried before screens

again used.

When cutting silk crepe, chiffon or any sheer material, first place one layer of newspaper, pressed out smooth on the cutting table. Then place the material on the paper smooth and straight. Place the pattern on the material and pin through all to the newspaper. Cut out the garment and the material will not slip as you cut it and you have a nice smooth edge.

To keep pies or cakes from sticking to the bottom of the pan, set on a damp cloth until cool.

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
