## FILET CROCHET

Filet Crochet takes its name from Filet Brodé which it resembles. It is at its very best when done with fine thread and the finest needle, yet it is handsome in coarse thread. For the best effect, the crochet must be firmly and evenly done.

MATERIALS.-Any good thread is suitable. In the list below the size of Cordonnet crochet cotton is given with the size of hook and the number of meshes in an inch of the work. As the size of crochet varies with the worker, the number of spaces given is only approximate.

EXPLANATION OF TERMS.-Chain (ch). With a slip knot on the needle, pull a loop through, then a loop through that, etc.

Slip stitch (sl). A loop on the hook, hook through work, pull loop through both.

Single crochet (s c). A loop on the hook, pull loop through work, pull loop through the two loops.

Double crochet (d). A loop on the hook, thread over hook once, pull a loop through work, loop through two loops, loop through remaining two.

Treble crochet ( t ). A loop on the hook, thread over hook twice, pull a loop through work, crochet off in twos.

Double treble ( d t). A loop on the hook, thread over hook three times, pull a loop through work, crochet off in twos.

Space or mesh (s or sp). Chain 2, miss 2 sts of foundation, 1 d in next.

To add meshes at the beginning of a row work the required number of ch, plus 5 for turning, and proceed as usual.

The method of adding open meshes at the end of a row is as follows: Chain 2, a d $t$, joining where the last $d$ was joined. Each succeeding $d t$ is fastened under 2 threads in the middle of the preceding $d t$.

Puff stitch (see Figs. 31 and 32). A d in top of d below, 6 d in space below, join top of seventh $d$ to top of second $d$ with a sl st on wrong side of work, a $d$ in top of next $d$ below. Care must be taken to have all puffs on same side of work.

Picot (p). Chain 6, sl in first of chain.

EXPLANATION OF TABLES.-Tabulated directions are used for some of the designs, as they save space, and many workers find them easier to follow than the usual directions.

Each horizontal row of figures stands for one entire row of crochet. Every row is to be read from left to right. When you come to the end of a row of figures, turn your crochet. The letters at the top of each column tell what the numbers in that column represent. "S" means "spaces." "D" means "double crochet." The foundation chain is always three times the number of spaces in the first row, plus six. For example, in the pattern, Fig. 4, the first row has 35 spaces or meshes; therefore, chain 111, turn. The first four rows read as follows:

1st rou-Make 1 d in the ninth chain from hook, * ch 2, miss 2 stitches of foundation, 1 d in next. Repeat from * until 35 spaces are made. Chain 5, turn.
$2 d$ row-Same as 1st row.
$3 d$ row-Two sp, $4 \mathrm{~d}, 7 \mathrm{sp}, 19 \mathrm{~d}, 10 \mathrm{sp}, 4 \mathrm{~d}, 8 \mathrm{sp}$, turn.
4th row-Five $\mathrm{sp}, 4 \mathrm{~d}, 1 \mathrm{sp}, 4 \mathrm{~d}, 1 \mathrm{sp}, 4 \mathrm{~d}, 1 \mathrm{sp}, 4 \mathrm{~d}$, $6 \mathrm{sp}, 7 \mathrm{~d}, 4 \mathrm{sp}, 10 \mathrm{~d}, 2 \mathrm{sp}, 13 \mathrm{~d}, 2 \mathrm{sp}$.

From this, it will be seen that no attention is paid to blocks (solid mesh), although you can prove up your work in this way. Each single block consists of 4 d. Two or more blocks consist of three times the number of blocks plus 1. Always make 5 chain in turning. This makes the first space. When the row begins with d, use three chain for turning.

REFERENCE LETTERS USED IN TABLES. - Special reference letters are sometimes used in tabulated directions, and their meanings are as follows:
E.-Slip stitch over one space or four d.
W.-Chain 8, turn, 1 d in fourth ch from hook.
X.-Used to fill squares that would otherwise be left blank; the use of the letter prevents confusion.
F.-This means a "festoon" which is made as follows: Chain 3, miss 2 stitches of foundation, $s \mathrm{c}$ in next stitch, ch 3, miss 2 stitches of foundation, d in next stitch.
B.-Block. Chain 5, miss 5 stitches of foundation, d in next stitch; blocks are usually combined with festoons.

A neat way of finishing a triangular piece of Filet Crochet is with triangular meshes on the oblique edge. On the end of a row this may be done by joining with a $t$ instead of 2 ch and d . For the beginning of a row, 3 chain are made for turning instead of the ordinary 5 chain. See also the directions for Fig. 55, page 20.

We are aware that some workers in Filet Crochet do not depend on directions, but prefer to follow an illustration of the finished work. It will be found that a number of the designs in this book have been arranged to meet the preference of such workers.

Unless the edge is of d, it is a good plan to reinforce the edge with a row of s c , put [CONCLUDED on page 40]

Figure 3. CENTREPIECE. - Use No. 40 linen thread and No. 11 hook. Take a piece of linen 18 inches square and pin on the completed corners. Mark the outline of the crochet with a basting thread, and cut out the corners, allowing $1 / 4$ inch for a hem. After the corners are sewn in, work a row of spaces around the piece; finish the edge with a row of single crochet, a picot at every fifth space. These corners may be used for a table-runner or bureau-scarf, by using a strip of linen of the desired length. In a runner, the crochet should be inserted so that the rows of work are parallel to the ends of the piece. Four tassels at each end make a pretty finish for a piece of this description.

In this pillow the crochet is done with No. 30 Cordonnet crochet cotton and No. 11 hook, and is inserted in a narrow frame of linen. The edge may be finished with bobbin lace or an edging of filet crochet. Attention is called to the two beautiful panels, Fig. 63, "Spring," page 24, and Fig. 69, "Autumn," page 26. These designs would make attractive pillows, and could be made up in the same way as the Peacock design.

Figure 21. CENTREPIECE. NEZ PERCE DESIGN, Mate rials.-Two balls Cordonnet crochet cotton No. 30 ; hook No. 11
For the linen centre, trace a circle on a firm piece of linen, using a ten-inch plate, stitch along the line thus traced with the machine three times, then cut the linen close to the stitching and cover with very close single crochet (s c). Upon this work the pattern.

1 st row-Double (d), with 1 chain (ch) between in every stitch (st) around. The model has 277 spaces (sp) 2d row-Double in each $d$ and $d$ in each ch of previous row. $3 d$ row-Double in every other $d$ of $2 d$ row with 2 ch between d. (These ch must be worked tightly.) 4 th to 10 th rows-Same as 3 d row.
11th row-Widen circle by making 4 sp over the first 3 sp of previous row, then 6 sp over 6 sp ; repeat all around. 12th row-Count number of $s p$ in 11 th row and divide by 8 , to begin design. The number will depend upon the number of $s c$ it took for foundation around edge of linen. The model has 300 sp , divided by 8 equals 37 and 38 sp for each motif, or 2 sp for top of design and 36 and 35 sp , respectively, between motifs. This row reads: $19 \mathrm{sp}, 7 \mathrm{~d}$ $36 \mathrm{sp}, 7 \mathrm{~d}, 35 \mathrm{sp}, 7 \mathrm{~d}, 36 \mathrm{sp}, 7 \mathrm{~d}, 35 \mathrm{sp}, 7 \mathrm{~d}, 36 \mathrm{sp}, 7 \mathrm{~d}$, $35 \mathrm{sp}, 7 \mathrm{~d}, 36 \mathrm{sp}, 7 \mathrm{~d}, 16 \mathrm{sp}$.

13th row-Work sp to within 1 sp of motif, then make 13 d ( 7 d over 7 d and 3 d to right and left of 7 d ) ; repeat around. $14 t h$ row-Work to within 2 sp of motif, then make 25 d ; repeat around.

15th row-Work to within 2 sp of motif and make $13 \mathrm{~d}, 5 \mathrm{sp}$ ( d in every other d with 2 ch between, increasing the circle), 13 d , finishing 2 sp to left of motif. Between each motif widen 3 times by placing 3 sp over 2 at beginning and end of motif and midway between.

16th row-Work to within 2 sp of $\mathrm{mo}^{+} \mathrm{f}$ and make 16 d , $7 \mathrm{sp}, 16 \mathrm{~d}$; repeat around.

34 meshes
17th rou-Work to within 2 sp of motif and make 19 d , $9 \mathrm{sp}, 19 \mathrm{~d}$; repeat around.
$18 t h$ row-Work to motif and make 5 sp over $15 \mathrm{~d}, 4 \mathrm{~d}$, $9 \mathrm{sp}, 4 \mathrm{~d}$; repeat around.

19th row-Work to within 1 sp of d of last row and make $10 \mathrm{~d}, 7 \mathrm{sp}, 10 \mathrm{~d}$; repeat around.

20th row-Work to within 2 sp of motif and make 19 d , $5 \mathrm{sp}, 19 \mathrm{~d}$; repeat around.
alst row-Work to within 2 sp of motif and make 28 d , $3 \mathrm{sp}, 28 \mathrm{~d}$; repeat around.
$22 d$ row-Work to motif and 9 sp over 28 d , then 10 d over 3 sp , and 9 sp more over 28 d of last row; repeat around.
$23 d$ row-Work to within 1 sp of motif and make 16 d (covering 10 d of 22 d row and 1 sp to right and left). Between each motif in this row widen 3 times by placing 4 sp over 3 ; repeat around.

24 th row-Work to within 1 sp of motif and make 22 d ; repeat around.
${ }_{25}$ th row-Work to within 1 sp of motif and make 28 d ; repeat around.

26th row-Work sp all around, widen once over each motif and once between.

27th row-Space all around. $28 t h$ row-Space all around. 29th row-Five sp over 5 sp , then 5 d over next sp ; repeat around. 30th row-Same as 29 th row.

31 st row-Three sp over 3 sp and 11 d over next 2 sp and 5 d of 30 th row ; repeat around.
$32 d$ row-One $s p, 18$ d $(7$ over 2 sp and 11 more $d$, adding 1 d and widening for last time) ; repeat around.
$33 d$ row-Double all around.
34th row-Spaces all around.
Shell for Edge.-Chain 3, 3 d in same place, fasten with slip stitch to top of next $d$ of last row, ch 3 ; repeat around.

Figure 22. PILLOW. - Use No. 20 Cordonnet crochet cotton and No. 11 hook. Chain (ch) 270, turn.
1st row-Double crochet (d) in 10th from hook, 1 space (sp), (ch 2, miss 2, d in next), 7 d (including d after sp ), * $2 \mathrm{sp}, 7 \mathrm{~d}$; repeat from * 20 times more ( 22 blocks of 7 d ). Chain 3 , turn.
$2 d$ row-Miss $1 \mathrm{~d}, 6 \mathrm{~d}$ in next 6, * $2 \mathrm{sp}, 7 \mathrm{~d}$; repeat from *, ending row with 2 sp , ch 3 , turn.
$3 d$ row-Six d, $2 \mathrm{sp}, *$ ch 10 , miss $2 \mathrm{sp}, 2 \mathrm{sp}$ over next 7 d ; repeat from *, having 20 chs of 10 , after last 2 sp , make 6 d over 2 sp at end, ch 3 , turn.

4th row-Six d, 1 sp , * ch 2, miss 1 of $10 \mathrm{ch}, 7$ single crochet ( $\mathrm{s} c$ ) in next 7 of ch , ch $2, \mathrm{~d}$ in $d$ between next 2 sp ; repeat from ${ }^{*}$, making 7 d at end, ch 5 , turn.

5th row-Miss 3 d , d in next, 1 sp , * ch 10 , d in next s c, 2 sp over 7 s c ; repeat from * with 7 d at end, ch 3 , turn. 6th row-Like 4th row, ending with 2 sp .

Work 2 more rows with clusters of 4 sp , and 1 large sp, alternating. End each row with 7 d .

In $9 t h$ row-After 2 d ch of 10 make * $2 \mathrm{sp}, 7 \mathrm{~d}$; repeat 14 times, 2 sp , end row as before.

In 10th row-Work large sp as shown, then 7 d and 2 sp over those of last row, finish with large sp as before.

From this point directions for the border will be omitted and only the design of spaces and double crochet inside of the blocks of border will be given. These will not include any spaces between the blocks of straight edge.

11th row-Fifty-four sp. $12 t h$ row-Fifty-four sp.
13th row-Twenty-three $\mathrm{sp}, 10 \mathrm{~d}, 7 \mathrm{sp}, 7 \mathrm{~d}, 5 \mathrm{sp}$, $16 \mathrm{~d}, 7 \mathrm{sp}$.

14th row-Six $\mathrm{sp}, 4 \mathrm{~d}, 5 \mathrm{sp}, 4 \mathrm{~d}, 3 \mathrm{sp}, 4 \mathrm{~d}, 2 \mathrm{sp}$, $4 \mathrm{~d}, 6 \mathrm{sp}, 10 \mathrm{~d}, 14 \mathrm{sp}, 4 \mathrm{~d}, 3 \mathrm{sp}, 4 \mathrm{~d}, 4 \mathrm{sp}$.

15 th row-Three $\mathrm{sp}, 10 \mathrm{~d}, 1 \mathrm{sp}, 4 \mathrm{~d}, 13 \mathrm{sp}, 4 \mathrm{~d}, 2 \mathrm{sp}$, $4 \mathrm{~d}, 2 \mathrm{sp}, 4 \mathrm{~d}, 4 \mathrm{sp}, 4 \mathrm{~d}, 3 \mathrm{sp}, 4 \mathrm{~d}, 1 \mathrm{sp}, 4 \mathrm{~d}, 4 \mathrm{sp}, 4 \mathrm{~d}, 2 \mathrm{sp}$, $4 \mathrm{~d}, 3 \mathrm{sp}$.

16th row-Three sp, $4 \mathrm{~d}, 1 \mathrm{sp}, 4 \mathrm{~d}, 1 \mathrm{sp}, 4 \mathrm{~d}, 4 \mathrm{sp}, 7 \mathrm{~d}$, $9 \mathrm{sp}, 4 \mathrm{~d}, 1 \mathrm{sp}, 4 \mathrm{~d}, 1 \mathrm{sp}, 4 \mathrm{~d}, 13 \mathrm{sp}, 4 \mathrm{~d}, 2 \mathrm{sp}, 7 \mathrm{~d}, 4 \mathrm{sp}$.

17th row-Six sp, $4 \mathrm{~d}, 2 \mathrm{sp}, 4 \mathrm{~d}, 4 \mathrm{sp}, 7 \mathrm{~d}, 2 \mathrm{sp}, 7 \mathrm{~d}$, $2 \mathrm{sp}, 4 \mathrm{~d}, 3 \mathrm{sp}, 4 \mathrm{~d}, 2 \mathrm{sp}, 7 \mathrm{~d}, 5 \mathrm{sp}, 4 \mathrm{~d}, 5 \mathrm{sp}, 4 \mathrm{~d}, 3 \mathrm{sp}$, 4 d, 1 sp.

20 th row-Five $\mathrm{sp}, 4 \mathrm{~d}, 4 \mathrm{sp}, 10 \mathrm{~d}, 5 \mathrm{sp}, 22 \mathrm{~d}, 6 \mathrm{sp}, 7 \mathrm{~d}$, $1 \mathrm{sp}, 19 \mathrm{~d}, 6 \mathrm{sp}$.
$21 s t$ row-Eight $\mathrm{sp}, 16 \mathrm{~d}, 2 \mathrm{sp}, 4 \mathrm{~d}, 2 \mathrm{sp}, 10 \mathrm{~d}, 1 \mathrm{sp}$, $16 \mathrm{~d}, 1 \mathrm{sp}, 10 \mathrm{~d}, 2 \mathrm{sp}, 7 \mathrm{~d}, 3 \mathrm{sp}, 7 \mathrm{~d}, 4 \mathrm{sp}$.

Figure 24. TEA CLOTH. - Embroidery and crochet are very attractively combined in this handsome cloth. The diagram (Fig. 25) gives the measurements of the cloth, and the crochet can be easily carried out by the aid of the details. The embroidery is worked with cotton in satin-stitch. For the crochet use No. 30 Cordonnet crochet cotton and a No. 11 hook.
To crochet the insertion, chain 11. The first row consists of 7 d (see Fig. 26), every other row being widened two meshes at each end. For widening at the beginning of a row, ch 8 , turn, allowing 3 ch for 1 d , work 1 d into each of the next 5 ch and the last d of the preceding row, 7 d in all. To add solid meshes at the end of a row, when there is no foundation on which to work, treble are used, the first $t$ being fastened into the same place as the last $d$ in the row, and each succeeding t fastened through two loops at the bottom of the preceding $\mathrm{t}, 6 \mathrm{t}$ being made in all. The 25 th row begins at $C$ (see diagram, Fig. 25) and ends at D. At this point it would be well to compare the crochet with working model (Fig. 26). Complete two sides of the diamond, ending at E. Figure 27 shows the corner. Cut thread, join at $\mathbf{F}$ and work the other two sides of the diamond like the first two, ending at G. Join $G$ and $E$ with 11 ch . Cut thread and join two spaces from the end of the line at $H$. Work the final triangular piece like the first, completing the insertion

The illustration is a sufficient guide for working the edging, but the beginner will need directions for the corner. It will prevent confusion if the crochet is begun with the first row of this detail (Fig. 29) and the corner made first.

The pattern begins with the row marked A in Fig. 28, and it will help to compare the crochet with working model, Fig. 29, as the work proceeds.

$d$ in the side of the step forming a space, ch 2, fasten a $d$ in the corner of the step. This forms the first space on the next row.

Figure 48. LAMP-SHADE.-This shade is made of linen, with eyelet embroidery and inserts of filet crochet. The patterns of the three medallions and six triangles are given (see Figs. 49 and 51), and the crochet was done with No. 60 Cordonnet crochet cotton and No. 12 hook. The shade is 39 inches around and $73 / \nmid$ inches high, and is trimmed with bobbin lace, tassels, and crochet pendants. The lining is of colored silk. A perforated pattern of the embroidery, also the stamped linen, can be supplied
by the publishers.

Figure 60. TABLE-CLOTH.-This heavy white linen cloth has an insertion of filet crochet worked with No. 100 Cordonnet crochet cotton and a No. 14 hook. The edge is hemstitched and the insertion is put in with rolled hems. After the crochet is finished shrink it thoroughly. Then the linen, also thoroughly shrunk, is to be cut and fitted to the crochet.
To work the insertion, Fig. 62, make 1149 chain. Refer to the diagram, Fig. 60, and begin at A. Work 41 rows, ending at $B$. Turn, and work 299 short rows, according to Fig. 62, ending at E. Cut thread and fasten at F. Work the third side of the insertion like the second, ending at K. From here, a chain of 902 is made and its end fastened at E. The thread is again cut and joined at L. The last side is then worked like the first, according to Fig. 62.

Figure 59. IMITATION HEMSTITCH IN CROCHET FOR TOWELS, ETC.-This pretty crochet will be found very attractive for the opposite end of a towel decorated with filet crochet.
Make a ch of the required length; turn and work singles



Squares in filet crochet like those shown in Fig. 61 have many and varied uses. They may be finished with a picot edge and used as doilies, and four or nine squares joined make a nice centrepiece.

They may be used together for an all-lace bedspread or joined with alternate squares of plain or embroidered linen. The linen could be French-hemmed or hemstitched, and a touch of color added in simple outline embroidery or
cross-stitch. Crochet squares are lovely inserted in the ends of towels, when made small, in the corners of tablecovers, or used as borders of insertion around square cloths. Besides these designs many other patterns suitable for both filet crochet and cross-stitch are given in the Priscilla Filet Crochet Book No. 1, and many of the block patterns in the Priscilla Netting Book are also suitable for the purpose.

A bedspread made of strips of crochet like Fig. 66 and plain linen is very attractive; and the lily edging and insertion used in the same way work up into an exquisite spread.

The panel above and the one called "Autumn," on page 27, are both suitable for pillow-tops, chair-backs, door-panels, and bedspreads. For a pillow, insert the crocheted panel in linen, which may be either plain or embroidered, and finish the edges with a filet crochet edging or Cluny lace. The size
of the panel when finished will be governed by the thread used. (See page 3 for the number of meshes to an inch in threads of different sizes.) When the panels are made for chair-covers a nice finish for the edges is a row of plain double crochet with picots, or a simple picot edging.

This panel and "Spring," shown on page 25, are very attractive used on bedspreads, inset in the linen and bordered by a filet insertion of the proper width. Another pretty arrangement for a spread is to use either panel in the centre, four crocheted squares in the corners, and on the
sides, between the corners, the motto, "Early to Bed," etc., in Cameo crochet, which is given in the Priscilla Bedspread Book with full directions for working. This insertion could also be done in ordinary filet crochet or cross-stitch, as preferred. The two designs could be adapted for door-panels.

Use Cordonnet crochet cotton No. 50 and a No. 12 hook. Make a very snug chain, about a yard in length. At end of this chain make a shell of $* 3 \mathrm{~d}, 3 \mathrm{ch}, 3 \mathrm{~d}$ for the first corner, then 52 spaces *. Repeat from * to * for the three remaining sides. Cut off extra chain, join carefully and proceed with the first row of the pattern, placing shell in
shell at each corner, not forgetting to turn the work when starting each new row.

The edge finish consists of 2 sc in each square with 1 sc in each d, while at every 4 th d a picot of 5 ch occurs. This finish is used on both inside and outside edges of the border square. A picot is used at each corner.

Figure 94. LUNCHEON CLOTH.-Use No. 60 Cordonnet crochet cotton and a No. 12 hook. The model cloth is 40 inches square. The hemstitched hem is 2 inches wide, and beyond that is the crochet insertion, $31 / 4$ inches wide and set in 4 inches from the edge of the cloth. Then comes a strip of linen $31 / 4$ inches wide, followed by the crochet insertion, which is $7 / 8$ of an inch in width. The linen in the centre is $17 \frac{1}{4}$ inches square.
First crochet the two insertions and shrink thoroughly, and after shrinking the linen, cut and fit it to the crochet. The crochet is in four identical units with the ends joined in the course of the work to form a square. Each unit is 27 spaces wide and 202 spaces long. A little more than one-half a unit (one side) is given in the block pattern, Fig. 90, page 32. When one unit is finished, start the second on the double at the one hundred and ninetysecond line.

The inner insertion is worked in the same way, with butted ends, and is 6 spaces wide and 126 spaces long (see Fig. 92).

Figure 96. BURNS' "SELKIRK GRACE" LUNOH OLOTH.
"Some hae meat that canna eat, An' some wad eat that want it, But we hae meat and we can eat, An' sae the Lord be thankit. Amen."

This familiar verse of the Scotch poet has been very ingeniously arranged for insertion in a lunch cloth, as shown in the illustration.

The crochet in the model cloth was done with No. 50 Cordonnet crochet cotton and a No. 12 hook. The insertion is worked the short way, and is $21 / 4$ inches wide. The hem is $23 / 4$ inches wide, and is hemstitched at the corners. The completed cloth is 45 inches square.

Work one strip and corner of the insertion, then complete the second strip and corner and sew to the first strip,
and so on. The block pattern of the insertion is shown in Fig. 97, the letters indicating the connections. If a larger cloth is wanted a coarser cotton should be used.

This unique coffee cloth shows Talleyrand's famous lines used as an insertion. The block pattern is shown on this page and the next (Fig. 99), each strip of insertion
being 13 rows wide and 169 rows long. The crochet in the model cloth was done with No. 50 Cordonnet crochet cotton and a No. 12 hook. The cloth is 33 inches square, and has a hem $23 / 4$ inches wide, hemstitched at the corners. The insertion is $21 / 4$ inches wide, and is worked the narrow way. Complete one strip and corner, then work second strip and corner and sew to the first strip, and so on. Coarser cotton could be used if a larger cloth is preferred. The letters in the pattern indicate connections.

Figure 100. CENTREPIECE. - This centrepiece of heavy linen has four square insets worked with linen thread No. 40 and a No. 11 hook. The diameter of the centrepiece is 26 inches and the insets are $4 \frac{1}{2}$ inches square (see table for working, Fig. 101). The centre strips are 4 inches wide.
To make up, cut a circular paper pattern 26 inches in diameter, and mark on it the two cross strips, 4 inches wide. Cut three patterns-one for quadrant, one for centre square, and one for the half strip; cut the linen by these patterns.

Insert the crochet in the quadrants, allowing for one-quarter-inch hem. Finish edges of all nine pieces with
s c, except edge of crochet work. Crochet strips of spaces and sew them to the linen and crochet, thus joining the nine parts as shown in the illustration. Work a row of spaces around the centrepiece, and finish by a row of $s c$, with a picot every 7 spaces. Fig. 102

When the fifth block (blk) on edge is finished (at end of 10 th row) ch 10 , turn, miss 4 ch, 6 d in next 6 and 1 d in next $d$; finish row as shown. Regin next blk on edge in same way.
next the st on hook, and sl in next 7 ch . This leaves 2 ch . (If the worker finds the sl on a ch difficult, s c may be substituted with nearly the same effect.) Miss the 2 ch at end, ch 2, d in next d, ch 2, 7 d in 7 d ; finish as usual.

At end of next row, after last 4 sp , make 7 d in the 7 sl , ch 9 , turn, miss st next st on hook, 6 sl in next 6, miss next $2 \mathrm{ch}, 7 \mathrm{~d}$ in 7 d ; finish as usual.

At end of next row, after $s p s$, $d$ in $d$ next $s l, 6 \mathrm{~d}$ in 6 sl , ch 9 , turn and begin with 6 sl , miss next $2 \mathrm{ch}, 7 \mathrm{~d}$ in 7 d. Follow design as shown until there are 24 blks on diagonal edge.

For first side of mitred corner, when turning to make 2 d row of 24 th blk on diagonal edge, ch 3 , miss 1 d, 6 d on next $6,2 \mathrm{sp}, 7 \mathrm{~d}$; finish as shown.

Work again to inside edge and after 7 d over the 2 sp , ch 3, turn.

Miss $1 \mathrm{~d}, 6 \mathrm{~d}$ on next $6,8 \mathrm{sp}$; finish as shown.
Work again to inside edge, ending with the 4 sp just before last blk on edge, ch 5 , turn.

Doubles after first space, 3 sp ; finish as shown.
Work again to inside edge, ending with 7 d before last 2 sp on edge.

The next 14 points or "steps" on edge are like the 3d,
 point.

Next point is a blk of 2 rows of 7 d , same as first and second points. Then 19 points of sp as before, 1 point of $7 \mathrm{~d}, 4$ points of sp , and 1 point (at outer end), of 7 d .

After 2 d row of 7 d of this point, turn, sl across last 7 d , ch 10 , turn.
The rows are now worked at right angles to the others. Miss 4 ch st, 6 d in next 6 ch , 1 d in next d , ch 2 , d between 2 rows of d at side of last blk, $d$ in $d$ between 2 sp at side of next point, ch $2, \mathrm{~d}$ in centre of 5 ch at point, ch 2, turn, 7 d in last 7 d , ch 10 , turn.

Make 6 d on 10 ch as before, d in next d, $4 \mathrm{sp}, 6 \mathrm{~d}$, sl between 2 sp at side of next point, sl to centre of 5 ch at point, turn.

Six d in $6 \mathrm{~d}, 4 \mathrm{sp}, 7 \mathrm{~d}$ in 7 d , ch 10 , turn. Six d on $\mathrm{ch}, \mathrm{d}$ in next $\mathrm{d}, 4 \mathrm{sp}, 7 \mathrm{~d}, 3 \mathrm{sp}$, d in d between 2 sp at side of point, ch 2 , $d$ in 5 ch at point as before, ch 2 , turn. Double in d after next $\mathrm{sp}, 2$ more $\mathrm{sp}, 7 \mathrm{~d}, 4 \mathrm{sp}, 7 \mathrm{~d}$, This finishes the 6 blks across square scallop at corner. Turn. Slip stitch across last 7 d , ch 3 (for a d), 6 more d, $4 \mathrm{sp}, 7 \mathrm{~d}, 2 \mathrm{sp}, 6 \mathrm{~d}$, sl between 2 sps on side of next point, sl up to point, turn.

Six d, $2 \mathrm{sp}, 7 \mathrm{~d}, 4 \mathrm{sp}, 7 \mathrm{~d}$, turn, sl across last 7 d . Chain 3 (for a d), $6 \mathrm{~d}, 4 \mathrm{sp}, 7 \mathrm{~d}, 3 \mathrm{sp}$, d in centre of side of point, ch 2 , d at point, eh 2 , turn.

Three sp over next $3 \mathrm{sp}, 7 \mathrm{~d}, 4 \mathrm{sp}, 7 \mathrm{~d}$, turn and sl over 7 d.

Further directions are unnecessary, as the design may be easily copied from illustration, and joinings are as described. When joining to a point made by a blk, make a d at side of blk, ch 2, d at end of blk, turn for next row. When corner is all joined, the blks are again taken up on diagonal edge, turning at end of 1st row of each blk with a ch of 3 .

To make the straight edge across blks on diagonal edge, join thread at end of corner, (ch 7, s c in next blk); repeat. The star indicates the mitre line.

Figure 104. BORDER OF DOILY. Explanation of Terms. - Chain (ch). Stitch (st). Slip stitch (sl). Single crochet (s c). Double crochet (d). Treble crochet (t). Space ( sp ) ; for a space, ch 2 , miss 2, d in next st.
Materials. - Cordonnet crochet cotton No. 40 or 50, steel hook No. 11 or 12. $3 d$ row-Slip stitch across 4 d , ch 3 (for a d), 2 d in next sp and 1 d in next d, $4 \mathrm{sp}, 7 \mathrm{~d}, 6 \mathrm{sp}, 4 \mathrm{~d}$, ch 2 , $d$ in 3 d of 8 ch , ch 10 , turn. 4 th row-Double crochet in 3 d ch st (counting back from last d of 3 d row) ch 2, d in last d of 3 d row, 6 more d, $6 \mathrm{sp}, 7 \mathrm{~d}, 3 \mathrm{sp}, 4 \mathrm{~d}$, turn. 5th row-Beginning same as 3 d row, finish as shown in illustration, ending with 10 ch .

6th row-Beginning same as 4 th row, finish as shown.

7th and 8 th rows-Work as shown, and after last 4 d of 8 th row, ch $\mathbf{1 0}$, turn.

9th row-Miss st next one on hook, sl in next 4, miss next 3 , $d$ in next 2 , also $d$ in last $d$ of 8 th row. Continue with sps and d as shown, finishing row as before.

10th row-Work as shown, after last 4 sp , making 4 d in 4 sl at end, ch 10 , turn.

11th row-Beginning same as 9 th row, finish as shown.

12th row-Work as shown, ending with 4 d in 4 sl . 13 th row-Chain 6 , miss $4 \mathrm{ch}, \mathrm{d}$ in next 2 ch and in next d, finish as shown.

Continue working design from illustration (Fig. 105), making edges as directed.

In 17th row work only to first sp , over last 7 d of 16 th row. After first sp ch 5, turn. Work back to outside edge.

The 19th row ends with first sp over last 7 d of 18 th row ; ch 5 , turn. Continue working as shown in detail of corner (Fig. 105), making outside edge as described for first scallop.

In 39th row work to first sp over 7 d of 38th row. After this $s p$, ch 5 , turn, $d$ in next d , ch $2,4 \mathrm{~d}$ on edge, turn, sl across 4 d , ch 3 , 3 d , ch 10 , turn. This finishes half of corner. To begin next half of corner, miss 1 ch , sl in next 4 ch , miss next $3 \mathrm{ch}, \mathrm{d}$ in next 2 ch , and in next d, ch 2 , sl in centre of 5 ch at next point, sl across next 2 sp and in next 3 d to corner of 7 d ; ch 2 , turn, 3 sp over 3 sp of last row, 1 sp over 4 d on edge, 4 d in 4 sl , ch 6 , turn. Miss 4 ch, 2 d in next 2, 1 d in next $d$, $3 \mathrm{sp}, 7 \mathrm{~d}$, sl in 5 ch at corner, sl across 2 sp and 3 d , to corner of 7 d . The work shown in detail of corner (Fig. 105) ends at this point. The design may be followed from the cut of completed doily, Fig. 104.

The thread is again joined near the lower edge (Fig. 105) and just enough work done to show method of working the inside edge (where border is joined to centre) on second half of corner.

For extra row on inside edge, join thread to a corner, (ch 3, d in next sp, ch 3 , s c in next corner) ; repeat.

1st row on outside edge-Join in centre between two scallops, ch 3 for a $t, 1 \mathrm{t}$ in same place, ch 2, s c in next blk, * ch 4, s c in next blk; repeat from *, making a s c in centre of blk at point, and 2 t between scallops.
$2 d$ row-Chain 5, sl back in second ch for a picot, ch 2, s c in next loop; repeat.

This border for doily matches the border of cloth, F'ig. 103.

THREAD. Most of the work in this book was done with Cordonnet crochet cotton. The table on page 3, which gives the size of the thread and of the corresponding hook and the number of meshes per inch, was made upon this basis. The size of thread made by different manufacturers varies. For instance, a No. 40 linen thread is nearly as coarse as a No. 20 cotton thread. Therefore, if crochet is made with any other than Cordonnet cotton, it will probably require a different sized hook and make different sized meshes than are given in the table.


Figure 107. TOWEL WİTH INSERTION IN CAMEO CROCHET (see Fig. 106 and page 3).-This new and beautiful form of filet crochet has the solid portion of the design worked in color. There must be a separate colored thread carried for every group of blocks in the row, which are separated by open spaces worked in white, since the color cannot be carried over the white. In changing from white to color, ch 2 , tie the colored thread in the top of the next $d$ in previous row; ch 2 with color, pulling the last st of ch through both the colored loop and the white. When crocheting with the color, carry the white along, crocheting over it. The white thread must be pulled tightly or it will show through the colored stitches. When taking up the white again, the last colored $d$ is not finished, but the white thread is pulled through the last two loops of color. The color is now dropped, to be picked up again on the next row when the process is repeated. The insertion was worked with Cordonnet crochet cotton, white No. 40, blue No. 30, and No. 11 hook. See page 3 for illustration of work in full size.

Figure 108. FLOWER INSERTION. - This design can be worked from the illustration.
For the scallops, 1 single crochet in edge, chain 9 , miss 2 spaces, single crochet in next; repeat for entire length of edge; turn, 4 single crochet, 1 picot, 4 single crochet, in each loop of 9 chain. This charming pattern would combine prettily with the floral edging, Fig. 116, page 42, for towels and scarfs, and the separate units could be adapted in many attractive ways.

on after the pattern is completed. Sometimes the edge of single crochet is varied by making a picot at every 10th or 12th stitch

The ability to crochet square should be learned and cultivated, as resulting in superior work and greater range of design.

When crocheting for any length of time, the fingers may become chafed. To avoid this, a good plan is to use a finger from an old glove.

LAUNDERING.-Although a new piece of work does not usually need to be laundered, it adds greatly to its appearance. The crochet should be squeezed, not rubbed, in good soap-suds. It should then be rinsed well without twisting.

When crochet is to be combined with linen, both the linen and crochet should be thoroughly shrunk. The crochet is then pinned on the cloth and the cloth cut to fit the crochet. This is the only way to ensure a perfectly smooth piece of work

After a piece is finished, it should be pressed on a thickly padded board, under a damp cloth.

Figure 109 is a very handsome insertion that is adaptable for a bedspread with alternate strips of linen. The large unit would also work up into a square and could be used for a spread with linen squares; a suitable edging could be arranged from the insertion by the addition of scallops. The adaptations of the units of designs are various, and their possibilities should be studied by workers in search of new combinations.

DESIGNS. Workers wishing to copy or alter patterns for filet crochet, or, having some artistic ability, to make original designs, and finding it tedious to rule a great many squares, may buy paper already ruled. It is sold under the name of cross-section paper, and can be bought where artists' materials are sold.

The first row of the table begins at the outside edge of the crochet. The last row ends at the outside edge. The crochet was made with Cordonnet crochet cotton No. 20 and hook No. 11.

EDGE. - Fasten at point of scallop, ch 3, 1 t in angle, 3 picots, eh $3,1 \mathrm{~s} \mathrm{c}$ in corner, work 6 times down side of scallop, ch 3,1 t in each angle, ch $3, \mathrm{~s}$ c in corner, ch 3,1 t in angle, 3 p , ch $3,1 \mathrm{~s}$ e in corner, work 6 times up sides of scallop, ch $3,1 \mathrm{~d}$ in middle of point, 3 p , ch $3,1 \mathrm{~s} \mathrm{c}$ in corner; repeat.

The blocks in relief are marked $R$ in the Table, and are made as follows: A double, fasten 7 more $d$ in the same place, join top of last d to top of first d with a sl st on the wrong side of the work.

This 16 -inch doily has a 5 -inch linen centre. The crochet may be worked from the accompanying Table, but the detail, Fig. 112, may prove a sufficient guide for the experienced worker. This detail shows a complete scallop, the method of changing direction, the row of spaces with which the inside edge is finished, and the picot edging used on the scallops. The meaning of the letters in the Table will be found on page 3 . The figure with the letter shows the number of times the direction is repeated. Thus: E2 means slip stitch over two spaces, B3 means make three blocks, etc.

Figure 122. TOWEL WITH EMBROIDERED CROCHET. (See Figs. 119 and 121.) The crochet insertion for this towel is worked according to the design, Fig. 119. Use No. 30 Cordonnet crochet cotton and No. 11 hook. The model is embroidered with colored mercerized cotton, as shown in Fig. 121, the coloring being as follows: In the centre of the medallion work a flower in French knots, one rellow French knot in the centre, with seven of the same shade around it, and twelve of a lighter shade around those. The illustration, Fig. 121, shows how the green leaves are placed, these being done in chain-stitch caught down with a short stitch over the loop at the end. Smaller French-knot flowers, blue, pink, and lavencer, with yellow centres, are worked in the middle of each of the three solid figures that are grouped together. On the two-inch hem of the towel there is a design of the same flowers with stems in outline. The hem is double hemstitched and the same on both ends of the towel.

In the above insertion, Fig. $1201 / 2$, a slight variation from the usual filet crochet is shown in the wide mesh of 5 d , forming the horizontal stripe at the top and bottom of the design. But the working of the pattern without mistake has been made possible by the reproduction of the work in full size, thus making the counting of the stitches an easy matter. The insertion will be found very attractive for towels, and if done in carpet warp would be handsome for a bedspread.

## DIRECTIONS FOR FRONTISPIECE

Figure 1. TEA CLOTH. (Frontispiece.) Materials. Cordonnet crochet cotton No. 100, hook No. 14, and linen for centre. Shrink linen and crochet, then hemstitch a square to fit edging. The triangles may be buttonholed to the linen or closely whipped, as preferred. Explanation of Terms.-Chain (ch). Stitch (st). Slip stitch ( sl ). Single crochet ( s c ). Double crochet ( d ). Treble crochet ( t ). Space ( sp ) ; for a "space", ch 2, miss 2, d in next st. Long space ( 1 sp ) ; for a "long space," ch 5, miss 5 (if over a festoon miss festoon), d in next. Festoon (fest); for a festoon, if over a long space, ch 3 , s c in long space, ch 3, d in next d; if festoon is over a ch or over doubles, ch 3 , miss 2 , single in next, ch 3 , miss 2 , $d$ in next. Block (blk). A chain of 3 before a cluster of doubles equals 1 d ; thus " $3 \mathrm{ch}, 6 \mathrm{~d}$," are counted as 7 d in working next row. Both in triangles and edging in working doubles into doubles only the back thread of stitch is taken up, except in working inside edge of edging when both threads are taken up.
Figure 123. INSERTED TRIANGLE. (See Fig. 124.) Chain 7, turn.
1st row-Double crochet in 4 th from hook and in next $2 \mathrm{ch}, \mathrm{ch} 7$, turn.
$2 d$ row-Four d in 4 d , ch 3 , turn, ( 3 ch and 3 d count as 4 d in 1 st row).
$3 d$ row-Miss 1 d, 3 d in next 3 d, 2 d under next 2 of $7 \mathrm{ch}, 1 \mathrm{~d}$ into next ch st, ch 2, t in same st with last d, ch 7, turn.

4th row-* Double crochet in $\mathrm{t}, 1 \mathrm{sp}, 7 \mathrm{~d}$, * ch 3, turn. 5th row-Miss $1 \mathrm{~d}, 3 \mathrm{~d}$ in next 3, 1 sp , * 7 d , (last 3 made as in 3d row,) ch 2, t in st with last d, ch 7, turn. 6 th row-From * to * of 4 th row, $1 \mathrm{sp}, 4 \mathrm{~d}$, ch 3, turn. 7th row-Miss first $\mathrm{d}, 6 \mathrm{~d}, 2 \mathrm{sp}$, from * to end of 5th row.

8 th row-From * to ${ }^{*}$ of 4 th row, $2 \mathrm{sp}, 7 \mathrm{~d}$, ch 3, turn. 9th row-Twelve more d, 2 sp , from ${ }^{*}$ to end of 5th row. 10th row-From * to ${ }^{*}$ of 4 th row, $2 \mathrm{sp}, 7 \mathrm{~d}, 1 \mathrm{sp}$, 4 d, ch 3, turn.

11th row-Six d, 1 fest, $7 \mathrm{~d}, 2 \mathrm{sp}$, from * to end of 5th row.

12th row-From * to ${ }^{*}$ of 4th row, $2 \mathrm{sp}, 7 \mathrm{~d}$, one 1 sp (ch 5 , miss fest, d in next d), $1 \mathrm{sp}, 4 \mathrm{~d}$, ch 3 , turn.

13th row-Six d, 2 fest, $7 \mathrm{~d}, 2 \mathrm{sp}$, from * to end of 5th row.

Continue working in same way until there are 13 fest in 35 th row. In 36th row there are 131 sp .

The figure of design is begun in the 37 th row.
37th row-Make edge as usual, then 8 fest, 19 d (making 5 d in each 1 sp and 1 in each d), 3 fest; finish lower edge as usual.

38th row-Edge, $31 \mathrm{sp}, 19 \mathrm{~d}, 8 \mathrm{l}$ sp, edge.
39th row-Edge, 5 fest, 7 d, 1 fest, 7 d, 6 sp, 7 d, 1 fest, 7 d, 1 fest, edge.

40th row-Edge, one $1 \mathrm{sp}, 7 \mathrm{~d}$, one $1 \mathrm{sp}, 7 \mathrm{~d}, 6 \mathrm{sp}, 7 \mathrm{~d}$, one $1 \mathrm{sp}, 7 \mathrm{~d}, 5 \mathrm{l}$ sp, edge.

The design may readily be followed from the illustration from this point. The last row ( 88 th) being made entirely of d's. Work across diagonal side with s c.
Figure 126. EDGING. (See Fig. 125.) - Begin at "A." (See Fig. 126.) Chain 143, turn.
1st row (worked from outside edge to inside)-Double in fourth st from hook and in next $5,2 \mathrm{sp}, 7 \mathrm{~d}, 19$ fest, 7 d, ch 3, turn.
$2 d$ row-Miss $1 \mathrm{~d}, 3 \mathrm{~d}$ in next 3, $1 \mathrm{sp}, 191 \mathrm{sp}, 7 \mathrm{~d}$, $2 \mathrm{sp}, 7 \mathrm{~d}$, ch 8 , turn.

3 d row-* Miss 3 ch st next hook, 5 d in next $5,1 \mathrm{~d}$ in next d, $2 \mathrm{sp}, 7 \mathrm{~d},{ }^{*} 20$ fest, 7 d , ch 3 , turn.

4th row-Three d (as in 2d row), $1 \mathrm{sp}, 201 \mathrm{sp}, 7 \mathrm{~d}$, $2 \mathrm{sp}, 7 \mathrm{~d}$, ch 8, turn.

5th row-From * to ${ }^{*}$ of 3 d row, 5 fest, 55 d , (make 5 d in each 1 sp and 1 in each d), 7 fest, 7 d , ch 3 , turn. 6th row-Three d, $1 \mathrm{sp}, 7 \mathrm{l} \mathrm{sp}, 55 \mathrm{~d}, 5 \mathrm{l} \mathrm{sp}$; finish same as 4th row.

Continue working design from illustration and making edges as described. After 16 th row, ch 3 , turn, and work $6 \mathrm{~d}, 2 \mathrm{sp}, 7 \mathrm{~d}$ over those of preceding row. Continue in same way until there are 6 rows of d across point. After 6th row, turn, sl across last 7 d , ch $3,6 \mathrm{~d}, 2 \mathrm{sp}$, 7 d; finish as shown. Turn after 23d row and sl across 7 d and work as before.

At end of 31st row begin mitred corner. Make only 4 d at lower end of 31st row instead of the usual 7, turn and sl back over the 4 d , ch 8, turn.

S2d row-Double crochet in next d (after next fest), one more $1 \mathrm{sp}, 7 \mathrm{~d}$ (including the d after sp ) ; finish as shown.

33d row-Work through last 7 d of row, then 1 fest, ch 8, turn.

34th row-Seven d in 7 d ; finish as shown.
35th row-Work through last 7 d of row, 1 fest, ch 8 , turn.

36th row-Same as 34 th row. 37th row-Same as 35 th row.

38th row-Same as 34th row. 39th row-Same as 35th row.

40th row-Same as 34 th row. $418 t$ row-Same as 35th row.
$42 d$ row-Same as 34 th row.
$43 d$ row-After last 25 d of row, 1 fest, ch 8, turn.
44 th row-Twenty-five $d$ in 25 d ; finish as shown.
45 th rou-After last 4 fest, ch 8 , turn.
46th row-Double crochet in next d, 3 more 1 sp ; finish as shown.

Work next 6 rows from illustration, turning at inside edge as described for 34 th and 35 th rows.
${ }^{57}$ th row-Ends with 7 d, ch 3, turn.
58th row-Miss $1 \mathrm{~d}, 6 \mathrm{~d}$ in next 6 ; finish as shown.
59th row-Ends with 19 d , ch 3, turn.
61st row-Ends with 5 fest, ch 8 , turn, $d$ in next $d$; finish as shown.

63d row-After 3 fest, ch 8, turn.
65th row-After 1 fest, ch 8, turn.
67th row-After 2 sp , ch 5, turn.
68th row-Double crochet in next d, 1 more sp, 7 d , turn, and sl back over 7 d . This completes first half of corner.

To finish the corner begin as follows:
1st row-Chain 8, turn, miss 3 ch next hook, 5 d in next 5, sl in d between 2 sp , sl in next 3 ch , (to corner of point), turn.
$2 d$ row-Six din 6 d (counting 3 ch as 1 d ), ch 8 , turn.
$3 d$ row-Five $d$ on ch as in 1 st row, 1 d in next $d$, $2 \mathrm{sp}, 6 \mathrm{~d}, \mathrm{sl}$ in 3 d of 8 ch forming next point, sl in next 3 ch sts, turn.
$4^{\text {th }}$ row-Six d in $6 \mathrm{~d}, 2 \mathrm{sp}, 7 \mathrm{~d}$, ch 8 , turn.
5th row-* Five d as in 1st row, 1 d in next d, 2 sp , $7 \mathrm{~d}, * 1$ fest on next 7 d , ch 3 , miss 2 , s c in next, ch 3 , sl in 3 d of 8 ch of next point, sl in next 3 of 8 ch , ch 5 , turn.

6 th row-Double crochet in next d, ch $5,7 \mathrm{~d}$ in 7 d , $2 \mathrm{sp}, 7 \mathrm{~d}$, ch 8 , turn.

7th row-From * to * of 5th row (of second half of corner), 3 fest, ch 3 , miss 2 , s c in next, ch 3 , sl in 3d and next 3 of 8 ch of next point, (as in 5 th row), ch 5 , turn.

8 th row-Double crochet in next d, 3 more $1 \mathrm{sp}, 7 \mathrm{~d}$; finish as shown.

9th row-Work through second $7 \mathrm{~d}, 5$ fest; finish same as 7 th row, except that the 4 sl sts are made on last 4 of 19 d, ch 5 , turn.

10th row-Double crochet in next $\mathrm{d}, 5$ more 1 sp ; finish as shown.

11th row-Ends with 19 d , ch 3 , s c between 2 rows of 19 d , ch $3,4 \mathrm{sl}$ on last 4 of 7 d , ch 5 , turn.

12th row-Nineteen d on 19 d ; finish as shown.
13th row-Ends with 7 d ; then finish as 11th row.
14th row-Seven din 7 d; finish as shown.
Continue working as shown in the illustration, joining rows worked inward, same as 5th, and beginning rows worked outward with long space as shown.

The 39th row ends with a 3 ch and a sl at outer end of the 4 sl (over 4 d ) at end of 31 st row of first half of corner. Turn and again sl back over the 4 d at end of 31st row, turn.

40th row-One sp, $21 \mathrm{sp}, 7 \mathrm{~d}, 2 \mathrm{sp}, 7 \mathrm{~d}$; finish as shown
41st row-Work toward inside cdge and after last 7 d of row, make 1 fest, 7 d , (the 7 d are made in the sp and across end of 4 d), ch 3 , turn.

42d row-Miss $1 \mathrm{~d}, 3 \mathrm{~d}$ in next 3 , 1 sp , one $1 \mathrm{sp}, 7 \mathrm{~d}$; finish as shown. This row begins straight edge after corner is finished. From this point the design may be readily copied without directions. After working the first large figure after the one at corner, the second one may be worked from illustration showing corner, if the first one is reversed. That is, the 1st row of second figure is same as last row of first, and so on the ough entire figure.

The difference between this fancy filet crochet and the ordinary kind is in the background, which is more open and lacy, and while the solid parts are the same, four or some multiple of four, small blocks are always used together, except perhaps on an edge. The large details show very plainly how the work is done and how the corners are mitred.

The triangles may be used for a variety of purposes besides the one suggested here. They may be set into sofa-pillows, scarfs, curtains, and bedspreads, or the entire spread could be made of the triangles joined together. This would be after the fashion of a patchwork quilt, the patches consisting of crocheted triangles.

It is quite an easy matter to make an insertion to match the edging, Fig. 126, as this is done by simply disregarding the scallops or points, leaving one row of open meshes below the solid design and finishing off the lower edge exactly like the top.

A beautiful spread can be made of the insertion and edging if heavy linen thread or carpet warp is used. The design is also good for curtains, pillow-scarfs, and any other household linens on which a crocheted edge may be used.

Figure 131. BABY SHOES. (See Figs. 129 and 130.) Materials. -One ball Cordonnet crochet cotton No. 150 and No. 14 hook. The two uppers and two soles are made separately and joined with d. The left shoe is given in Fig. 129, and the left sole in Fig. 130: the right upper and sole are made in the same way,

second sole like the first, and reverse it in joining to the upper.

UPPER. (See Fig. 129.) - Begin at A, ch 27, turn, d in 9 th ch from hook. 18t rowSeven sp. $2 d$ row-Chain 18, d in 9 th from hook, making $4 \mathrm{sp}, 7 \mathrm{sp}$ over 1st row, add 4 sp at the end of the row, etc.

Working back and forth, when $B$ is reached, turn and make 7 rows between $B$ and $C$. At C, ch 9 for the foundation of next 3 sp , ch 9 more and $d$ into the 9 th of the first ch; this will make the first of the 6 sp beyond $C$. The $d$ will lie across the top of the sp, leaving the hook at the upper right-hand corner of the sp, turn the work and add 5 sp . This makes altogether 6 sp . Then eh 15 , turn, $d$ in 9 th and make 3 sp over the $\mathrm{ch}, 6 \mathrm{sp}$ over $6 \mathrm{sp}, 3 \mathrm{sp}$ over ch, and 3 sp over the body of the work, 7 d, etc. When $D$ is reached, fasten and cut the thread; join it at E and work back and forth to F. Along the top of the upper (from D to F)

Work 3 s c in each sp along the edge, making a picot of 4 ch after every 6 sts. At H, ch 12 for a buttonhole-loop and cover with s c. Sew a tiny pearl button on the point

[^0]:    31 st row-Twenty sp, 4 d over 5 ch, ch $4,1 \mathrm{t}$, ch 4 , 4 d ; turn. 32 d row-Chain 5, 4 d over 4 ch , ch $2,4 \mathrm{~d}$ over $4 \mathrm{ch}, 21 \mathrm{sp}$. Repeat from beginning.

    Edge to Finish.-Fasten thread in 1st d, 3 s c in next 3 d , ch $3, * 3 \mathrm{~s} \mathrm{c}$ in first loop, ch $1,6 \mathrm{t}$ with picot ( $5 \mathrm{ch}, \mathrm{s} \mathrm{c}$ in 1st ch) between each t in next loop; repeat from * to loop on side of point, ch 1, 6 t with picot between each $t$ in loop on other side of point and continue down side.

    Finished scarf is 1 yard 19 inches long without edge. Use No. 50 Cordonnet cotton and No. 12 hook.
